



Patriot Guard and Lil' Firecrackers to give veterans salute at Hardtner's Fourth of July Parade

Pit BBQ beef and pork, first sandwich free, at 4 p.m.; Hole-in-one golf, \$49,500 prize, 4-8 p.m.; Obstacle course, water games, volleyball, corn hole, turtle races in afternoon; Sack races 6 p.m.; White elephant sale/silent auction, 5-8 p.m.; Fireworks extravaganza at dark (10 p.m.)

When the Patriot Guard Motorcycles from Medicine Lodge roar into Hardtner, Kansas, on the Fourth of July with their American Flags blowin' in the wind, a wave of patriotism could well flood your body.

Hardtner's Fourth of July Parade starts at 10 a.m., but the climax will come at the end this year when the Patriot Guard does a veterans salute. Patriot Ronald James will give the tribute to veterans. Any little kids (Lil' Firecrackers) dressed in red, white and blue (and waving flags handed to them) are invited to parade around the open park area downtown during the salute. The Field Artillery Song (which is a favorite featuring all the branches of government) will play during the tribute.

Hardtner Chamber of Commerce spokesperson Syd Sterling said Hardtner's theme this year is Freedom, Family and Fireworks. With 2020 being an election year, she said many parade entries are political. Sterling asks that you practice social distancing as much as possible – stay six feet away from your neighbor.

Extra entertainment at the parade includes vocal performances by Sophia Dawson of Medicine Lodge and also the

Williams family of Kiowa.

After the parade, drop by Yur Place for lunch. Then head to the shady Achenbach Park for a variety of games: volleyball at 11 a.m.; corn hole tournament (in old hospital parking lot) at 1 p.m.; turtle races/Calcutta at 3 p.m. Throughout the afternoon there will be an obstacle course for all ages in the park featuring water games, hay bales, tires, you name it! Sack races start at 6 p.m.

Sterling said a gospel group will be performing in Achenbach Park, courtesy of Kristina Myers. She also said that vendors are welcome to sell their goods in the park throughout the day.

Jarred Tyree is in charge of the hole-in-one contest backed through Schuessler Insurance of Alva. He said the prize for a hole-in-one is \$43,500. The contest runs from 4 to 8 p.m. Tyree said that last year they had an approximately \$5,000 payout in the contest.

At 4 p.m., go to the park to pick up one of Hardtner's famous Pit BBQ sandwiches.

Sterling said they are burying 800 pounds of beef in the pit at the fairgrounds. Tuesday she said someone just donated two whole hogs that will also be smoked in the pit. Your first sandwich is free. Thereafter the sandwiches are \$1 each or by your generous donation.

"We are always looking for more help to cook the meat," Sterling said.

Some of the leftover meat will be sold at the White Elephant Sale/Silent Auction from 5-8 p.m. For the first time ever in the history of Hardtner's 4th of July, the white elephant items will be pre-priced and some will be part of a silent auction. This is to be safer to not spread the coronavirus.

"We always need more items donated to the white elephant sale," Sterling said, "especially baked goods." Monetary donations are welcome as well. All of these help fund Hardtner's celebration.

It's all worth it when Hardtner's \$10,000 worth of fireworks explode in the sky at dark, about 10 p.m.

A life punctuated by protests

The recent widespread protests following the death of George Floyd at the hands of the Minneapolis police have caused me to think about other protests that have marked my life. Protesting has been a way to bring attention to injustice and inequality throughout American history, starting with the Boston Tea Party.

I've never engaged in a protest unless you count the parade in my hometown when a factory was planning to close. My younger brother and I rode our decorated bicycles in the parade with parental permission. My older brother was probably taking photos for our weekly newspaper.

The first protests that caught my attention were the civil rights boycotts, sit-ins and marches around the beginning of the 1960s. I remember watching film of the events on black and white TV newscasts of that time.

The movement began while I was

still in high school. Up to that time, I had heard vaguely about separate (supposedly equal) school buildings, water fountains labeled for use by African Americans, and other signs of segregation. Having traveled very little, mostly to visit relatives in nearby states, I had never seen any of these indicators.

Our small Missouri town contained only white people, unless you counted the Native American triplets in my class or the Japanese lady who lived next door. Our Japanese neighbor was my first exposure to international culture. She married a career army man who was stationed at Ft. Leonard Wood, Missouri. She and their three children lived next door with her husband coming home on weekends.

She and my mother became good friends while my younger brother and I sometimes hung out with her children although they were several years younger. I exchanged Christmas cards with her for years, even when she moved to Nebraska.

While looking up the dates of the Civil Rights Movement, I found Feb. 1, 1960, in Greensboro, North Carolina, listed as the first and longest sit-in of the movement. But the first sit-in actually may have occurred in Oklahoma on Aug. 19, 1958, at the Katz Drug Store, a segregated supermarket that had lunch counters.

The Katz sit-in was organized by Clara Luper, a teacher and civil rights activist. Luper, her son and daughter, and a group of NAACP Youth Council members entered the segregated Katz Drug store and asked to be served. They were refused service, and the police were called. They were not arrested although they were met with increasing hostility and even threatened. The sit-in lasted from opening to closing hours with the

students bringing out their schoolbooks and studying as they waited. Two days later, Katz desegregated its lunch counters in three states.

I had the privilege of meeting Clara Luper years later while attending a state convention for broadcasters. Apparently she hosted a radio talk show, the Clara Luper Show, with her son from 1960 until 1980. There were few women in the male-dominated field so she and I naturally gravitated to each other. We talked only briefly. I didn't know then the place she occupied in Oklahoma history.

I remember the protests in Birmingham and the March on Washington in 1963. On the latter occasion, Martin Luther King Jr. delivered his "I Have a Dream" speech. Bloody Sunday in 1965 involved the march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama. The Civil Rights Act was signed into law in 1964. This was followed by the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Numerous court battles over desegregation followed.

In the middle of the Civil Rights Movement, the women's rights protests began. The push was for equal pay for equal work. The Equal Pay Act was passed by Congress in 1963 benefiting both women and minority races.

Then the Vietnam War began. On Nov. 15, 1969, an anti-Vietnam War protest was held in Washington, D.C. There were sit-ins and protests on college campuses. Those of military draft age who didn't agree with the war were the most vocal.

My memories of the 1970s bring to mind the debates about long hair on men and very short skirts on women. A contingent of young people seemed determined to make wholesale changes in American society.

Then the ERA women's movement began. The Equal Rights Amendment failed in 1982 when not enough states voted to ratify it.

There have been other protests since the 1970s, but they haven't been as widespread and far-reaching until those we've seen this June. However, each has had some effect on our laws or our society. I wonder what the Black Lives Matter protests will accomplish.

Perhaps someday we'll find a better way to push for social and legal change. Until then, protests will continue to be a way of life in the United States.

Woods County commissioners approve contracts

The Woods County commissioners approved several contracts during their meeting Monday. Present were commissioners Randy McMurphy, David Hamil and John Smiley. Grant Gibson filled in for County Clerk Shelley Reed, who was absent.

The commissioners approved a contract with County Budgeting Services LLC for the FY20-21 audit for \$7,500. They also approved a contract with the same company for the County Health Department audit for \$1,350.

No action was taken on a road use agreement with Invenergy. The area involved is in District 3, and Smiley said he wants to wait until he gets a legal opinion from the district attorney.

The commissioners acknowledged an audit engagement letter from the state auditor's office indicating they will be coming to audit Woods County.

Only one annual bid was received for printing of ballots. The commissioners approved Royal Printing Co. to print the digital ballots for the Woods County

Election Board.

The Woods County financial report ending June 30, 2018, was approved.

The commissioners approved two resolutions for District 1 projects involving some blacktop and the Salt Fork River bridge north of Alva. No action was taken on three other resolutions; one is in District 2 and two are in District 3. The commissioners thought there might be errors in the description of the location of the three projects. All are for what is known as the Freedom shortcut. Each of the three projects will cost around \$3 million to \$4 million so they want to get it right.

A contract with EOYS (Eastern Oklahoma Youth Services) at the Pittsburg County Regional Detention Center at a rate of \$38.97 per child per day was approved. Commissioners also approved renewing a contract for detention transportation with the Oklahoma Office of Juvenile Affairs.

Payroll, warrants and claims were approved as well as the minutes of the last meeting.

Enid man injured in Grant County rollover

An Enid man was injured when his vehicle went off the road and rolled in Grant County. The wreck occurred Sunday at 5:43 p.m. on US-64, two-tenths of a mile east of County Road 850. The location is approximately 6.5 miles east of Nash.

Michael David Owens, 45, of Enid, was driving a 1993 Chevrolet Suburban westbound on US-64 when it departed the roadway to the right for an unknown

reason. The vehicle came back on the roadway, rolled one and quarter times and came to rest in the middle of the highway.

Owens was transported from the scene by Air Evac to OU Medical in Oklahoma City where he was admitted in critical condition with head, trunk internal, trunk external, arm and leg injuries.

Trooper Kyle Rosine investigated, assisted by Trooper Ray Robertson, Pond Creek Police Department, Grant County Sheriff's Department, Pond Creek EMS, Pond Creek Fire Department and Air Evac.

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
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



Alfalfa County Commissioners deeded over building to Great Salt Plains Health Center

This week's Alfalfa County commissioner meeting was far shorter and less crowded than that of last week.

Jay Hague, Stan Tucker and Marvin Woodall got down to business, beginning with the previous meeting's minutes. Those were quickly approved, sending the men on to review and sign payroll warrants and maintenance and operation warrants for payment. (There were no blanket purchase orders or road-crossing permits.)

Next, county clerk Laneta Unruh gave commissioners the paperwork for the indebtedness publication that is published in the newspaper twice a year. They signed that and moved on to approve a handful of standard agenda items: a professional legal services contract between Alfalfa County and Tisdal & O'Hara, PLLC for FY 2020-2021, a private property access easement for District 2 for the north middle 80 acres of 01-25-12 to remove concrete/rip rap to be used on projects, a lease renewal letter for Security National Bank from Alfalfa County, and then a

new fund for court clerk called "OBF Donations for Court Areas" – 1235-1-1400-2005. A contract between Eastern Oklahoma Youth Services and Alfalfa County for juvenile detention services garnered approval as well.

Shortly before adjourning, commissioners deeded over the fire-damaged former DHS building in Cherokee to the Great Salt Plains Health Center (GSPHC) for \$10. GSPHC Practice Administrator Aaron Jenlink, RN, was onsite to talk about the project. He said the plan is to gut the building, fix the fire damage, and replace the windows and doors (removing the unsightly boards). Jenlink said as far as utilization goes, nothing is set in stone yet. So far, ideas for use have been future offices, storage, and maybe even a daycare. Right now, the goal is to have the space patched up, operable and available, he said.

Two more test positive in Alva

The Oklahoma State Department of Health (OSDH) situation update has made it official. Two more Alva residents have tested positive for the novel coronavirus. That brings the total cases for Alva (and Woods County) to seven with five recovered.

Alfalfa County and Harper County remain at one each. Major County has eight cases with seven recovered. Woodward County lists 12 positive tests with 11 recovered. Beaver County has 30, all recovered. Garfield County

has 67 residents testing positive with 54 recovered.

Tulsa County leads the state in the number of confirmed cases at 3,424 followed by Oklahoma County with 2,913, Texas County with 987 and Cleveland County with 886.

As of Tuesday, June 30, there are 13,757 confirmed positive cases of COVID-19 in Oklahoma, up 585 from Monday according to the OSDH. The number currently hospitalized is 315.

Two additional deaths were reported, neither occurring in the past 24 hours. One in Rogers County was a male in the 65 and older age group. One in Mayes County was a female in the 36-49 age group. There are 387 total deaths in the state.

Gov. Kevin Stitt and Oklahoma Commissioner of Health Lance Frye MD were scheduled to provide an update on the State's response to COVID-19 at 2 p.m. Tuesday. A live stream will be available on Gov. Stitt's Facebook page.



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KDH has good financial report, new clinic director, ready for bids on therapy/wellness addition

Manor gradually opening with outdoor visitation by appointment only (visitors must wear masks); Limited visitors to see hospital patients

At the Tuesday, June 23, regular meeting of the Kiowa (Kansas) District Hospital (KDH) Board of Directors, they covered a full agenda. All members were present in the clinic lobby as President Pat Myers called the meeting to order, including Jim Parker, Jeff Miller, Chantae Simpson and Miranda Walz-Allen. Other KDH personnel attending were CEO/CFO Janell Goodno, Operations/IT/Manor Administrator Phillip Anton, Business Office Manager Tara Girty,

Hospital DON Robyn Whitaker, Quality Manager Brandy McKitrick, Rural Health Clinic Director Lacey Volker, Manor DON Robin Davis and members of the public. As everyone entered the meeting they had a temperature check and answered a brief survey regarding COVID-19.

Then the board held a brief special meeting Thursday via Microsoft Teams to take some more action regarding the therapy/wellness addition. The board received the final approval letter from

the USDA and approved the resolution for bidding of the construction contract (a negotiated bid process).

Giving an update on the project, Goodno said the plans are about 90 percent complete with the engineers and architects. She said they have at least three bidders at this point. "We want them to have healthcare experience," she said and added that once they have the general contractor, possibly locals can

contract to some of the work. She said COVID-19 has put everything with this project behind schedule.

KDH Manor and Hospital Administrator Reports

In the hospital administrator report, Goodno reported Skylar Cowan-Houlton, who is already an RN at KDH, will also be community health clinic coordinator. She is training with Macie Malone who held the position and continues to provide some remote marketing services for KDH.

Cowan-Houlton resides in Hardtner with her husband Colby Houlton and will also do community outreach and discharge planning. Additionally, she'll work with Quality Director Brandy McKittrick on quality planning. When McKittrick identifies a weakness or gap, Cowan-Houlton will mitigate some of the issues and educate the patients. She will also work with Barber County EMT Director Mike Loreg.

Goodno welcomed the new Rural Health Clinic Manager Lacey Volker. She is an RN and graduated from NWOSU. Volker and her husband Brandon live north of Alva (between Alva and Hardtner). Volker replaces Heidi Courson who recently moved from Kiowa with her family for a job opportunity for her husband Brett.

The CEO said that Barber County is "opened up" again as set by the county commissioners. She confirmed the hospital is still "locked down" but is allowing two visitors per patient. Employees are still screened each morning with a temperature check, etc.

Anton said of the manor, "We are in Phase II of gradual reopening with

outdoor visitation." He explained that friends and family can come visit by appointment. Visitors must wear a mask and they speak through a sound system if needed for both parties to hear through the plexiglass in between them.

Anton said with grant money they were able to get nice headphones and a sound system they are using for this visitation. The grant also was enough to purchase three iPads with cases, he said.

Regarding agency nursing expense, Anton said, "We are changing our approach." He added that they are looking at CNAs training and crossing the state line. "Signing bonuses are helping," Anton said. "We're making progress."

The manor received zero deficiencies in a COVID-19 survey. "It's easy because we live it everyday. We're happy about that!" Anton said.

The manor dining room equipment was an agenda item. Goodno said much of it needs to be replaced due to infection control issues. Replacement items include, in part: 27 chairs with solid arms to help prevent resident falls, sofa, ottomans, table tops, the puzzle table (which includes a piece of felt), etc. Everything needs to be a wipe-able surface, she explained.

All these things can be replaced with stimulus money, Goodno said. The board approved the purchase of \$9,311 for these dining room equipment items for the manor.

Whitaker addressed the board about the need to replace the scope and processor used in surgical procedures. She listed several options – basically the scope is \$49,200 and the processor is \$30,387. Because they want to seek

more options and information, the board agreed to table the item until next month.

The following medical staff appointments were approved: Dr. Khalid Afaneh MD (Laboratory) and Arden Blodel CRNA (Outpatient Surgery).

Statistics Slow with COVID-19 but Financials Look Great with Stimulus Money

The days of care at the hospital in May were 45 "which is extremely low" Goodno said. "You'll see low volume reflection throughout our statistics and all of our reports." May admissions to the hospital were just 13. Total outpatient visits were 409 and clinic visits just 287. "We're slowly picking up but COVID hurt," she said.

The hospital's financial statement for May showed they had \$322,402 total operating revenue. Total operating expenses were \$518,872. This made a loss of \$196,470. Total non-operating revenue (mainly tax revenue) was \$81,871.

Goodno made a separate category for HHS Stimulus Money COVID-19, which was \$3,090,368. The PPP Loan Forgiveness money was \$843,400 for a total of \$3,933,768. This made the hospital's gain for May \$3,819,169.

The CFO said she is hesitant to spend any of the COVID money. It must be spent on COVID-related expenses. The money must be spent on payroll, infection control, etc, or the hospital must show proof of their lost revenue. Goodno said she expects a sizable loss of property tax revenue from the county due to the cratered oil and gas business.

For May the manor had total operating revenue of \$140,134 and total operating expenses of \$153,330. That made a loss of \$13,196. With the addition of \$6,050 mainly tax revenue, the loss was \$7,145.

Goodno said the manor received \$122,000 stimulus money from HHS. That will be reflected on their June financials. The combined balance sheet of both facilities showed an overall gain of \$5,259,842. "So much of that is stimulus money," the CFO said.

All the financial and statistical reports received board approval.

At the end of the meeting the board held an executive session with no action taken afterward. The next KDH board meeting is July 28.

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

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

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
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
