Alfalfa County man arrested in confusing domestic incident

When law enforcement arrived on the scene of a reported domestic incident, they took conflicting witness statements. Eventually the man was arrested and taken to jail while the woman refused medical help but later agreed to be checked out.

Court records show on April 21 about 1:36 p.m. Alfalfa County Sheriff's Deputy Gary Mast was contacted by dispatch stating there was a domestic situation in progress at the home of Cody Dalrymple in Nescatunga. The 15-year-old girl filing the report is the daughter of the alleged victim, Rebecca Phillips. The girl said the dispute had been physical earlier but was now just verbal.

When Mast arrived at Paradise Lane, he saw Sheriff Rick Wallace talking to Dalrymple. Wallace said Mast needed to talk to Phillips; she might have a broken elbow. Phillips was sitting on the ground approximately 50 yards south of the residence. As he approached, Mast asked Phillips if she needed medical assistance, and she said, "No. If I go I want my mom to take me."

Mast asked Phillips what was going on. She stated Carl Schneberger and Kim (unknown last name) were supposed to take a dolly to Enid that morning to pick up a Mustang that Dalrymple bought. She said Dalrymple became angry because Schneberger was pounding on the door. He became even more angry because Phillips wouldn't get out of bed and answer the door. Phillips said she was still sleeping.

Phillips stated that Dalrymple got out of bed and began to yell at her, calling

her names. She said Dalrymple threw a screwdriver at her, and it stuck in the wall. She said Dalrymple came at her, tearing her shirt. Phillips said they were in front of the bed when this happened.

Phillips said she didn't know how her elbow got injured but thought she may have struck it on the bed frame as she was falling. She said Dalrymple struck her in the back of her head with his fist, causing her to urinate. When Mast asked her to fill out a statement, Phillips said her hands were so swollen she was unable to hold a pen; however, Mast states he could not see any visible evidence of her hands being swollen.

In the affidavit, Mast states Phillips was very hard to understand and follow. She seemed to ramble and looked disheveled. Her hair was unkempt, skin appeared dirty, and eyes were bloodshot. While recalling the incident, Phillips cried but no tears were visible. While speaking she closed her eyes and made little eye contact. During the interview, Mast states Phillips complained of ants and said she didn't know she was sitting on an ant den. As Phillips was wiping ants off her arm, Mast states he was unable to actually see any ants crawling on her.

Mast then spoke to Phillips' juvenile daughter who said she was awakened by yelling. She got up but couldn't see anything. She went to Dalrymple and Phillips' room where "I saw Cody on top of my mom hitting her." She said she told him to get off her mom and stop hitting her. She said Dalrymple then threatened to hit her so she ran back to her room.

The juvenile said she could hear Dalrymple calling Phillips names

and cursing at her. She said she saw Dalrymple break the glass on the front door and break the TV. She said she went outside because she could hear her mother calling for her. The juvenile stated while outside Dalrymple was threatening to hit Phillips with a piece of wood that had nails in it. She stated Dalrymple started calling her mom names again, and she called 911.

Deputy Mast then talked to Dalrymple who stated he and Phillips got into an argument and it escalated. He said while they were arguing, Phillips grabbed a screwdriver and started walking toward him. She was very angry, and he felt threatened. He said he grabbed Phillips by the shirt, tearing it.

Dalrymple said he pulled Phillips to the ground, went down on his knees and restrained her. He said he asked Phillips if she was done. Dalrymple said at that point Phillips' daughter came into the room. He said he tried to explain what was going on, "I didn't want to look like a piece of crap." He said when the two of them got up off the floor, they were still arguing. Dalrymple said he separated from Phillips and removed himself from the situation.

In the affidavit, Mast states it was hard for him to determine if a domestic had occurred. Phillips said she was sure her elbow was broken. Pictures were taken of her elbow. Phillips said she had actually hurt her elbow a week before during an argument with Dalrymple, but she thought she hit it this time and injured it further. Phillips had small scratch marks on her arms which

It's wheat harvest time

Now that the rain has stopped and temperatures are in the triple digits, wheat fields are drying out enough for harvest. We'll be seeing more combines and wheat trucks on the roads so drive with caution. The yields from harvest are low but wheat prices are high so we hope the two will balance out.



It's been a tough year for farming with high prices on fertilizer and just about everything else.

Increasing gas prices have added to the load for farmers and everyone in general.

Gas station clerks say they are seeing customers who used to come by once a week now come several times a week because they can't afford a fill-up.

Pollsters have found that people are venturing out with less fuel in their car's tanks these days and the predictable result is that more people are running out of gas. Calls to AAA roadside service from people whose cars are out of gas are rising to pre-pandemic levels

A Washington Post-Schar School poll bears that out: 44 percent of drivers randomly contacted between April 21 and May 12 said they have only partially filled their car's gas tank, a figure that rises to 61 percent for drivers with incomes below \$50,000.

And more than 6 in 10 drivers have made the decision to drive less – making fewer trips to the grocery store, for example – while more than 3 in 10 said they are driving at reduced speeds, which can improve gas mileage.

5 Steps to Restart a Car That Has Run Out of Gas

In case you run out of gas, a towing service posted these tips on their website:

Running out of gas is usually the last thing people want to do when going for a drive but it happens more often than most people think.

The modern car engine and its fuel system have become quite complicated and running out of gas can lead to the uncomfortable situation of the car not starting back up.

Thankfully, it isn't too difficult to get

the car moving and we have explained it below:

- Fill up your tank. Look, this goes without saying but obviously your car or truck will need its fuel to get back running again. Good news is: you do not need to fill the fuel tank up all the way to get it going. All you need is a couple of gallons to get the car to the nearest fuel station.

For this reason it's always a great idea to carry something called a "Jerry Can" with you to store the fuel.

Hopefully you can get a friendly person to give you a ride to the nearest fuel station where you can purchase the gas.

Get back to your car and fill the tank in a safe manner. One thing to keep in mind is to ensure that you are getting the right type of fuel.

- Let the fuel get in the system

You have to understand that the fuel system doesn't consist of a single hose that runs all the way to the combustion chamber of engine. It is full of nooks and crannies along with valves so, it needs some help to get the fuel flowing. To ensure the best chance of success make sure that your vehicle is level. If you've been stranded up or down-hill, do your best to push the vehicle to a level spot.

Next, prime the the gas pedal a few times before turning the engine on. This will allow the fuel an easier path to fill the fuel system.

NOTE: It is important to be patient and not try to turn the engine on before the fuel has reached where it needs to be. Not only will the engine not turn on, it can lead to the battery being drained which is a far worse situation to be in.

- Allow the fuel injectors to do their thing. Most modern cars have some type of fuel injection system and if your car does too then it means that the fuel is pumped using an electric pump. Turn the key halfway through at which point the electrical systems like the dials and displays turn on. It is absolutely crucial not to turn the key all the way in as that can damage the car. Wait for a couple of minutes, turn off the car and repeat this a few times. After three or four times, the fuel pumps would have pumped enough fuel to allow for the car to start up without any trouble.

- Try starting the car. By this step we

assume that the fuel system is no longer dry and the ignition chamber has access to the fuel that it needs for the engine to start up. Turn the key all the way in and the car will probably splutter a few times before turning on.

It is important not to keep trying to fire the car up. If it doesn't work after a couple of tries then go back to the previous steps. Usually, this is not required and the car should fire up quite easily but that is not always the case.

Give the previous two steps a couple more goes and hopefully that will get the car running again.

- Last resort. Sometimes, your car just refuses to start. This could be because of something else that is wrong with the car that is preventing it from starting up. This can also happen if air gets trapped in the fuel system and it has no way to get out.

The most important thing to do is not to get frustrated and keep trying to turn the car on until the battery is drained.

If you have given it a decent try and it still hasn't started then it is time to call the professionals. That is why it is paramount to sign up for some type of roadside assistance provided the car manufacturer isn't providing. Keep their contact numbers handy and get in touch with them immediately to get yourself out of the spot of bother.

And on another continuing issue, here are a couple of notes about new Covid-19 vaccines in the works:

New Booster for Covid-19

Moderna says by late summer it can offer a Covid-19 booster shot that provides protection against the omicron variant of the virus. The company has reason to believe this booster might last a whole year, not four months or so, which we have come to expect from vaccinations.

The Guardian reports:

Dr. Paul Burton, Moderna's chief medical officer, said the new vaccine raised antibody levels to such a degree that one booster a year could be enough, unless a substantially different variant calls for the vaccine to be redesigned again.

"The data we show today are really important because we get a really strong



Waynoka School Board handles summertime business

With all members present, the Waynoka Board of Education transacted routine business at its regular monthly meeting Monday morning, hearing how the end of school went, how summer school is going, and how things are going financially.

Summer School Activities to Include Trip to Great Salt Plains Lake

Elementary Principal Patricia Burrows told the board about end-of-school-year activities. The school held an Awards Assembly and Field Day on the last day of school. Local firefighters turned up at Field Day with a thorough drenching to drown out the heat of that afternoon. "The teachers and staff worked extremely hard to make this year successful and the end product was nothing less than excellent," Burrows told the board.

Summer camp is underway, with 35 students entering first through third grades, and 22 students entering fourth-sixth grades enrolled for the school's "Survivor" themed STEM camp this summer. During the past week, students built shelters, made tie-dyed, t-shirts for clothing, learned navigation through compasses and mapping, experienced food preservation by dehydrating fruits, veggies, and meats, and received survival first aid training from our local Waynoka Ambulance EMTs, Burrows reported. Thursday consisted of a survival of the fittest Ninja Warrior obstacle course.

This week, students will learn about wildlife tracks from the game warden, bird identification, an insect adventure with the OSU Entomology, and fishing and pond life with a culminating trip to Great Salt Plains Lake on Thursday for fishing and hiking.

The last week, bike and ATV safety is planned with the grand finale of June 23 spent in Wichita at Exploration Place Science Museum.

Enrollment for all students is this week on Thursday, June 16, from noon to 4 p.m. and Friday, June 17, from 9-1.

Personnel: Callisons Resign, Daycare Assistant Needed

Early in the meeting, the board approved the School Resource Officer agreement with the city of Waynoka for next school year. Later, they voted to accept two resignations: those of Valerie Callison and Kent Callison.

They went on to approve the employment of Kendra Mitchell as a certified teacher under a temporary contract, and they reemployed the list of support staff. They also approved employing a daycare assistant to fill a vacant position.

The board approved both the Teacher Salary Schedule and the Extra Duty Schedule for the 2022-2023 school year.

Superintendent Sums Up Financial Situation

"Looking at finances, as you see the General Fund expenditures are up \$48,000," Superintendent Cline said.

"That rise is due to the lights to be put up," among other projects, he said. Ad valorem is still down; last year it was down more than half a million.

"Last year, our ad valorem was \$428,000. Two years ago it was \$979,000, so we've taken a hit," Cline said. "Gross production is up \$129,000, and daycare and child nutrition revenue is up.

Revenue is up in the child nutrition fund – but "this will be the last year everybody eats free," Cline said, "so we'll go back to the paid services next year. Daycare expenditures are down on the year and our revenue is up, but over all we're \$31,000 in the hole."

The board approved the consent agenda, consisting of minutes of previous meeting(s); reports on the general, building, activity, and bond funds; encumbrances of the general, building and bond funds; and change orders.

At the end of the meeting, the board went into executive session to discuss the purchase of "real property" by the school district. After returning from executive session, the board approved that purchase, with an address given of 1214 Rose in Waynoka. A Zillow.com listing that says it is a three-bedroom, two-bath brown brick home valued at between \$90,000 and \$129,000.

Other Board Business

The board approved a fundraiser request from the cheer team. They also approved a review of the student transfer policy and capacity limits, and they amended two policies regarding student transfers and student transfers for employees' children.

The contract with Chas. W. Carroll, P.A., to conduct the 2021-2022 audit, to be conducted during the 2022-2023 fiscal year, was approved.

The insurance proposal from Oklahoma Schools Insurance Group (OSIG) and the legal services contract with the Center for Education Law were both approved. They paused over the workers' compensation proposals, and then went with the lowest bid: \$8,717 from OSAG (compared with \$9,783 from the other bidder). The school has



South Barber School Board hires many new faces, Watts takes board seat

Receives state recognition, applies for more security funds

“We had a very good ending to the school year,” South Barber Superintendent Dr. Mylo Miller told the board of education at the June meeting.

The superintendent said proudly, “We kept our kids in school the last two years without interruption. We mitigated the learning loss.”

South Barber received state recognition for their excellence in working with youth with disabilities Dr. Miller told the board. He said the recognition is through a federal program – Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). It’s based on test scores and educational outcomes.

The superintendent said he applied for a Safe School and Security Grant for \$125,000. Because of the horrendous school shooting in Uvalde, Texas, he expects the money will be available. Miller said they should know something in July. The funds would allow South Barber to increase their security, in part by improving their front door entry to the school buildings.

The board approved Karen Watts of Hardtner as the new board member. She fills Position 5, District 1 on the board. She told the Newsgram that she feels it’s important to step up and serve in your

community. Since no one had done so she felt compelled to volunteer.

In the absence of Board President Mark Pollock, Vice-President Bryan Quick conducted the meeting with all members present including: Deb Helfrich, Jenna Mostert, Mike Miller, Karen Watts and Emily Lohmann. Principal Brent Shaffer also attended as did Board Clerk and Office Manager Julie Johnson. Elementary Principal

Kaynette Scheck was also present via Zoom.

South Barber Board Hirings and Other Action

Nikki Brattin is the new fourth grade teacher to replace Kaynette Scheck who became principal. Brattin has been pianist/accompanist for the music department, also assisted in teaching 4th grade and also science and social studies.

J. Shawn Hooker (who coached at Burlington) was hired as the new K-12 physical education teacher; head basketball coach at the high school for the Lady Chieftains; and head basketball coach at the high school for the Chieftains.

Kristy San Soucie, who has worked at NWOSU and RSI, was hired as the new Art/Spanish teacher.

Kiowa man Steven Leech received board approval as the buildings, grounds and transportation director.

Heather Miller, wife of Dr. Miller, was hired by the board as the mental health liaison for the district.

Changes are occurring at South Barber’s daycare. Assistant Daycare Director Jennifer Birchenough submitted her

resignation, which the board accepted. They hired Terri Terrell from Shreveport, Louisiana, to fill the position. Daycare Director Teri Burke taught at a large daycare in Louisiana with Terrell and invited her to work in Kiowa.

The agenda listed possible action concerning retention bonuses for South Barber employees for the 2022-23 school year. However, the superintendent explained they’ve not yet received state funding so they’ll wait. The item was tabled.

Lori Sahadi received board approval to serve as the Summer Food Service for 20 hours/week.

Principal Shaffer was board approved as the driver’s education teacher this summer. He reported that 15 students are enrolled. The class is complete. He said Trooper Bryan Quick did the AAA Defensive Driving.

Shaffer projected high school enrollment this fall at 48 (noting a

antibody response against Omicron,” he said. “For the first time, we could really be looking at the potential for just once-yearly boosting, because we can get people to such a high level that they will take longer to decay.”

The new vaccine, called mRNA1273.214, combines 25 micrograms of the original Moderna Covid vaccine with 25 micrograms of vaccine specifically targeted at the Omicron variant. In the phase 2/3 trial, the 50mcg shots were given to 437 people who had already received two primary jabs and a booster of the original Moderna vaccine earlier in the pandemic.

It is important to point out that Moderna has not released all of the data that the Food and Drug Administration will need to evaluate this drug. And 437 test subjects are a small-ish sample.

The FDA’s vaccine advisory panel meets June 28 to talk about how to concoct vaccines for the fall that protect against whatever new variants emerge later this year. The newest technology allows vaccines to protect against two variants of a virus at a time.

A fourth Covid-19 vaccine is on the way

A panel of experts who advise the Food and Drug Administration about vaccine safety and policy recommends that the FDA approve a fourth Covid-19 vaccine that does not use mRNA technology. The Novavax shot is protein-based and is similar to flu and shingles shots. 
GEORGIA LEE MARTIN





LOYD THOMAS STOUT

Lloyd Thomas Stout was born, the youngest son, to Harry O. Stout and Lydia Elliot Stout, on September 2, 1923, on a farm in Alfalfa County northwest of Lambert, Oklahoma. He passed away at the Kiowa Hospital District Manor on June 9, 2022 at the age of 98.5 years of age.

He attended and graduated from Lambert School in 1941. His graduation class was the largest class to ever graduate from Lambert High School with 21 students.



Lloyd then enrolled in Northwestern State Teachers College in Alva. During his time in college, World War II began and not long after, a fresh faced 20 year old Lambert lad reported for duty

to Sheepshead Bay, New York, for training. Loyd and his three older brothers, Willard, Noble, and Fay would be among the 16.1 million active service men during the war.

He joined the Merchant Marines with his lifelong friend, A.B. Cochran. They were together on numerous dangerous trips across both the Atlantic and Pacific Ocean carrying World War II supply cargo. Many ships in the large convoys were sunk by submarines and aircraft at sea and large cannons high in the mountains as the ships approached land. After the war ended, Loyd stayed in the service until 1946. He spent a large portion of the time on a ship running deliveries in South America. He also started working at Boeing in Wichita, Kansas. During his time there he had moved up the ladder to Manager. He also played on a semi-pro basketball team while at Boeing and was recruited by Phillips 66. He played against many who were as great as him. Following his discharge from service, Loyd returned to NWOSU where he played one year of football for Earl Crowder (father of Stanley Crowder) while finishing his teaching degree. Loyd also played four years of baseball and five years of basketball due to gas rations.

In the 1950's he started playing for a minor baseball league known as Sooner State League of Ardmore. He played for Amarillo, Pampa, and Ardmore

teams. He even played against Whitey Herzog, the manager and coach of the St. Louis Cardinals. It was during this time, that his friend, Larry Sanchez from NWOSU, joined Loyd in playing in the minor baseball league.

After graduation, Stout took his first teaching job at Byron-Driftwood School while in the baseball playoffs and missed the first three weeks of school. While he was at Byron-Driftwood Schools, he coached baseball, volleyball, basketball and tennis (boys and girls) teams. Lynn Puffinbarger was one of his friends who helped run the school until he got there from playing in the minor league tournament. He was Superintendent of the school and was at Byron-Driftwood for seventeen years, until the school was closed. Paul LaBrue played basketball for Stout and went on to play in a Division I College. Loyd married Martha Coppock on December 29, 1955, in Oklahoma City during the All College Basketball Tournament.

In 1954 Loyd played semi-pro baseball with the Cherokee Team. In 1950 his team won third place at the National Baseball Congress of America. Quinton (grandson) played in 2013 at the National Baseball Congress of America and placed fourth, decades later.

In 1968 he joined the Cherokee Schools as girls basketball coach, taught Driver's Ed and Health and P.E. classes, was assistant football coach and junior high principal. He retired in 1982.

Loyd was inducted into the Oklahoma Girls Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame in 1983. His record at Byron-Driftwood was 246 wins and 156 losses for the boys teams, and 208 wins and 161 losses for the girls. At Cherokee, his girls teams had 205 wins and 124 losses. He has made a valuable contribution to high school athletics in Oklahoma.

Loyd was inducted into the NWOSU Sports Hall of Fame in 1993 and two years later Paula was inducted. They were the first father and daughter to be inducted into the Hall of Fame.

He was an avid sports fan traveling to watch the Cherokee Chiefs play basketball during the season. He would attend District, Regional, Area and State Basketball Tournaments. He had his favorite spot at the Big House where he watched lots of games. Loyd and Martha were honored at one of the state

basketball tournaments for attending the games for 50 years.

Loyd enjoyed watching Paula and Gayle play college basketball. He also enjoyed watching his grandchildren play baseball, football, basketball, and volleyball. He was very proud of them and tried to attend as much as his health allowed. His last game was in November 2021 when he drove himself to watch Morgan play volleyball at Wichita State. Loyd was a gentleman, very humble, and a real likeable person. Just about anywhere he went, someone would say, "There is Loyd or Coach Stout." Roy Rogers would say, "He never met a man that he didn't like." Loyd Stout fit this to a T.

He loved visiting with anyone whether it was at the Sonic/Subway area, post office, restaurant, ball games, etc. He attended the Cherokee Friends Church his whole life.

Loyd is preceded in death by his wife of 55 years, Martha; his parents; brothers and sisters-in-law, Willard (Evelyn), Noble (Eva Mae), Fay (Ruth); his sister and brother-in-law, Ina Murphy (Clifford); Jack Elliot and Nellie Bonham who were raised by Loyd's parents; a nephew, James Stout, and a niece, Janice Elliott.

He is survived by his son, Mickey Stout and wife, Amanda of South Hutchinson City, Kansas; daughters, Paula Crandall and husband, Steve of Lyons, Kansas, and Gayle Stout of Oklahoma City, grandchildren, Clayton Crandall and wife, Taylor of Concordia, Kansas, Quintin and Cameron Crandall of Lyons, Kansas, Morgan and Logan Stout of Hutchinson, Kansas, great granddaughter (Clayton and Taylor) in July, sister-in-law, Wanda Elliott of Lawrence, Kansas; many nieces and nephews plus many close and dear friends.

The duo officially grabbed the baton from Kiowa’s Labor Day 5K Race founder Kent McBrayer. A few weeks ago McBrayer put a notice in the Newsgram that the race could no

longer occur due to no one stepping up to assume the role as director of the 36 year event.

McNett said she read that notice and decided “I want to step up.” She texted her friend MacKinney with the idea to be co-directors and without hesitation she said yes.

“We have big shoes to fill,” the two said of McBrayer. They said how thankful they are for all the volunteers who help make the race possible. They are excited that Kiowa’s First State Bank, a branch of Alva State Bank, will continue to sponsor the race. The new co-directors thanked Melissa Simpson, who had helped McBrayer, for her help in the transition.

When asked about passing the baton, McBrayer said, “Based on the meeting with these two ladies, I am very excited about their enthusiasm for the 5K and taking it over. I have every bit of confidence that this will translate into a good first-race event for them.”

Pre-K-12 counselor at Burlington School, McNett said she’s entered in the 5K and Fun Run nearly 20 years, running by herself and then with her four children. A stay-at-home mom

Jill Daughheteer kept the beat 44 years before retirement at South Barber

Taught under seven superintendents as band director and librarian

“Fun.” Jill Daughheteer used that word multiple times during her retirement interview with the Newsgram. Anyone who knows her would agree that Daughheteer made her band concerts fun; her classroom fun for students; and had fun with her co-workers through the years.

Retired Elementary Principal Marcia Cantrell who also taught third grade about 23 years, commented on her co-worker, “Jill was dedicated to music education. She directed some of the most clever elementary vocal music programs I have ever seen. She used talent and humor and seemed to be able to get students to perform to the best of their ability.

“When the students started our band program Jill would take a bunch of “noise” coming out of their horns and within a few weeks they would be able to play songs. Amazing! I would sit and listen to these same students when in high school pep band and concert band play beautifully.

Jill’s personality came out in wonderful ways. We would have monthly (or more) staff meetings. Jill could be counted on to make the meeting hilarious with a joke or a funny story.

“I will tell one story – she was on her knees telling a joke in the teachers lounge

and (Superintendent and Principal) Mr. (Paul) Nelson walked in. Without even looking at him she said ‘let us pray’. We all cracked up and he said ‘ok, you have

to tell me the joke too’. The older staff will remember the joke. Such wonderful memories! I wish Jill the best in her retirement.”

“Doing music of any kind you’ve got to have fun,” Daughheteer said as she retired from South Barber USD #255 in Kiowa, Kansas at the end of the 2021-22 school year. She retires after 44 years in education, all at South Barber USD#255. Raised in Hardtner, one of the four Wilhite sisters, she attended Hardtner High School which consolidated into South Barber with Kiowa and Hazelton. She was in the second class to graduate from South Barber High School in 1975.

A NWOSU graduate, Daughheteer earned a bachelor of arts degree in music education in December 1978. Then she did her student teaching at South Barber. January 2, 1979 was her first day as a teacher at South Barber, teaching vocal music at the K-6 grade. She also assisted teaching band with Ross Miller.

“He moved and I just stayed,” Daughheteer said. “I was having fun teaching elementary music so I did that four-and-a half years before becoming band director.”

Daughheteer Remembers Marching Band and Comical Moments

“I loved doing programs,” Daughheteer said recalling years of




Jim Blunk, D.O. to Retire After 41 Years

seasonal band concerts and special ones in between for parents. In her earlier years, she had the band march during halftime of football games. She took multiple ensembles and soloists to band contests. In 1989 she took the SBHS Band to compete at the Liberty Bowl in Memphis.

"We had 68 kids in the band then that we took plus sponsors. We tried to have some fun," Daughhete said.

"We always did fun music. At spring concerts we did popular music because kids like to play what they hear. I had them play music I liked. I wanted the kids to enjoy music of all kinds from all ages. I wanted them to know a variety of songs – from patriotic, popular and more for the rest of their lives."

One of her most hilarious moments came at one of her concerts a few years ago when Daughhete literally had one of her shoes fall apart as she directed the band. It was so bad that she stopped for a minute, explained to the crowd, missed hardly a beat and continued directing barefoot.

Her favorite concert was the first one students didn't have to wear masks after the worst of the Covid Pandemic. "It was absolute fun. The Covid restrictions were awful."

Daughhete Adds Librarian to Her Resume, Shaffer Comments

In 1989 she married her husband Kenny Daughhete and eventually along came their son David. "Band took so much time," she remembered and decided to get her master's degree

as a library media specialist. As a librarian she didn't have nightly or weekend activities she had to attend so she could make more time for family. It's a good thing as she became pregnant with their daughter Jessica and required bed rest.

She became librarian about 2000 when David was in kindergarten. "The best part of being librarian was reading to the grade school kids and finding the right book for the right child. That was at all levels." Discussing changes in the library, she said in her early days computers were just starting. That's when the card catalog was used and notes were taken by hand. "Now everything is on-line. Reading has declined and that's sad."

During that interim time when she was not band director Daughhete was a standout in many Border Line Theatre productions, calling it "my musical fix. We had a lot of fun." She taught high school humanities; sixth grade reading and spelling. She was STUCO sponsor and Jr Class sponsor "for years." Daughhete was sponsor for Scholar's Bowl eight or nine years and also for the Sr Class.

Current 7-12 Principal Brent Shaffer said, "My first year Mrs. Daughhete was the STUCO sponsor. Our first big event was Homecoming. She was in charge. She kept telling me I've got this don't worry. I did worry. But I learned I could trust her. Whether it was Homecoming, Senior Sponsor, Band, etc. I could count on her. She was a professional and did a GREAT job doing most with the least sometimes. She was a trusted employee and friend. I and South Barber will miss her!"

Mentioning Shaffer in her interview, Daughhete said, "Mr. Shaffer didn't understand the arts at first. But, he was open to learning about things. He's a good guy that tries to do his best for everyone. One time we had him play a cowbell in a song. He was sweatin' it. It was so fun! He has a personal relationship with the kids."

Remembering her earliest days of teaching at the elementary with a crew of longtime teachers that included her sister Janet Elwood, she said, "Those were such goods times. The teachers were great helpers. We had all these women teachers and Max McGee – all cream of the crop. We taught together forever and were all good friends."

Daughhete Speaks of Mentors, Student Compliments Her Daughhete recalled when she was first band director Ron Holmes was high school principal. "His expectations were so high for his teachers, you knew how to be professional."

To the best of her recollection, she taught under seven superintendents – Paul Nelson, Glen Piper, David Bailey, Bob Hightree, Brad Morris, Andi Williams and Mylo Miller.

"I love my job. I knew I wanted to be a music teacher at a very young age," she said. "Mom was our big music influence. We sat around and she played piano – we sang and played instruments. Mom could play anything by ear, but give me the music!" She said they didn't miss watching the Lawrence Welk Show.

"How lucky was I? I got to listen to music the first hour of the day. Music can totally change your mood."

Daughhete told proudly that at least five of her students went on to be a music teacher. One of her students was 1985

graduate Steve Noble who just retired this week after 30 years in education and 13 years as superintendent of Seaman School District 345 in Topeka. As a senior he made the KMEA Honor Band as a percussionist who played the snare drum.

Of Mrs. Daughhete, Noble said, "She always put kids first in everything she did. I always looked forward to her class first hour because she made it fun and interesting. When we marched she told me, 'Steve, just create the drum cadence and get the other drummers to follow.' Her expectations were high, but she allowed us the freedom to meet our expectations. She trusted us. It made us want to do good for her. She was one of my favorite teachers of all time. She influenced me as a student to do my best and as a public educator to do my best for the students I taught and as an administrator. Her influence was far and wide in my life."

Ironically Steve Noble's father Roger Noble was a mentor for Daughhete. For years she shared South Barber's music department with respected vocal teacher Roger Noble, known for his rich voice and directing abilities in school, church

and community. Daughhete has played keyboards at Kiowa's United Methodist Church for years where Noble was music director before his passing.

"I respected Roger Noble so much. He was a huge part of my life," Daughhete said, her eyes tearing. "He was a good man and we had so many good times – concerts, contests and church events. I was his student as a junior in high school. To go from student to co-worker – he made me a better teacher. He taught me how to get my band students I's at contest."

Since about 2010-13, Daughhete said she's seen declined enrollment. For a band director that means "choosing your music carefully and editing parts."

Looking at her students through the years, Daughhete said, "I'm most proud of the people they've become. The majority have become productive citizens – good people."

"It was bittersweet to retire. But it's time for some younger blood. It was a good run," she said.

Now she plans to dedicate lots of her time to their only grandchild Cooper, age 6. In retirement she plans "to scrapbook and anything else I want." She purchased season tickets to Music Theatre of Wichita and will continue to play at church.

To her band students through the decades, Daughhete said, "I may not remember your name, but I remember what instrument you played!"


