

Woods County negotiating with Harper County on E-911 services

The Woods County Commissioners met Jan. 7 with Harper County Commissioners and E-911 boards from both counties. Grant County representatives were also present.

The meeting was for discussion about Woods County providing E-911 services for Harper County. This would include answering all 911 calls and dispatching all fire and EMS calls. Woods County already provides this service for Grant County.

Before this can be done, Harper County will need to fix some radio coverage problems in their county. They will need to find a vendor to perform coverage analysis and devise a plan to install adequate radio infrastructure, according to State 911 representative Lance Terry. Harper County will also need to get quotes for a CAD and call taking system. Terry explained the importance of using the same vendor as Woods County.

During their meeting Monday morning, Jan. 13, the Woods County Commissioners voted to continue

negotiations with Harper County on a contract for enhanced E-911 communications services.

In other action, the commissioners approved a floodplain permit related to the railroad in the area of the Noel Elevator.

Several items on the agenda listed payments to individuals for right of way and any damages in the bridge project north of the Greenleaf Fire Station. Claim forms of \$500 each were approved for Jenny Blair Foutch and Travis Foutch; Jenny Roberta Silcott; Travis Allen Jacobson and Misty Jacobson; Troy Edward Roach III; and Teresa Elaine Rogge.

New members were appointed to the Woods County Enhanced E-911 Communications Agency Board. They are Commissioner David Hamil, chairman; Alva Police Chief Ben Orcutt, member; and Woods County Clerk Shelley Reed, secretary.

The commissioners also approved minutes, warrants and claims, and blanket purchase orders.



Losing the stress-eating weight

Some days it seems like my to-do list multiplies with each hour. The things I planned to accomplish that day keep being pushed aside by more pressing matters. For instance, I accidentally dumped half a diet soda on my desk and phone Monday. Dealing with that took some time out of my day!

In addition to work, I'm still handling chores related to my husband's death like getting account names changed, canceling services and figuring out passwords. It's a slow process.

With the added stress of the past couple of years, I've managed to put on a dozen extra pounds. When waistbands get tight, it's time to look at what I'm eating. I checked my BMI online, and it is sliding into the overweight category. It's not all scales and waistbands. I find when I'm not eating healthy foods, I have less energy.

Several years ago, I managed to lose a little over 20 pounds by loosely following a low carb, high fat diet. Known as the keto or ketogenic diet, it can be a little daunting if you

carefully track carbs, fat and protein.

I was already trying to lose some weight by cutting out foods with added sugar when I first heard of keto. My daughter told me about this new keto diet, and I was intrigued. As I usually do when I want more information on a topic, I read a book. "Keto Clarity" by Jimmy Moore was an interesting account of his success on the keto diet, but it didn't give enough details about why it works and how to implement it. So I did more research which meant more books.

I noticed an interesting thing. As long as I was reading a book on healthy eating, I was able to stay motivated to follow a diet. It might not work that way for everyone, but it certainly works for a bookworm like me.

Unfortunately, I've read just about all the books on keto that interest me. This time, I'm reading two books I already own. You may already have heard of "Eat Fat, Get Thin" by Mark Hyman, a functional medicine doctor. It's loaded with information showing the keto diet is a healthy way to eat. Later chapters provide information to get started. Then it describes how to transition into maintaining your weight loss.

The second book I'm reading focuses on implementing the diet and skims over the health benefits. "The Keto Diet" by Leanne Vogel only comes in book form, not an e-book

download. It was more expensive, but it's loaded with helpful graphics, lists and recipes. The author is a little restrictive in her recipes since she's sensitive to dairy products and doesn't include them.

Vogel suggests looking for a phone app to help track macro-nutrients (carbs, fat, protein). I searched for keto diet, found several free ones, and picked one called Carb Manager because the makers had an Australian name (wombat). It's been eye-opening. Apparently I was still eating far too many carbs and far too little fat. I also made the mistake of using the word "keto" in a food search, and the app bombarded me with screens offering the premium, pay by the month version of the app. It took a little experimenting to figure out the word triggering that reaction.

The name keto comes from the process of fat-burning triggered by the diet. It switches the body from the usual glucose energy source to using stored fat as well as fat consumed in the diet.

Most recommendations are scaled to 70 percent fat, 20 percent protein and 10 percent carbs of the calories you consume. It can be adjusted to less fat and more carbs if that seems to work better for your body.

Unfortunately, even vegetables come with a carb count. Those in the starchy category are off-limits in the early stages of this diet. About the only fruits considered low-carb are berries.


After about 10 days watching what I eat and tracking it in the app, I've lost three pounds. Hopefully, in a few weeks I'll be back to what I consider my normal weight. Then I can relax a little on the carb counting. But for now, the dessert table is off limits!

Freedom school board tables most of the agenda at Monday night meeting

Approves new 'online shopping mall' fundraiser and senior trip itinerary

The Freedom board of education had a slightly chaotic board meeting Monday night. A bond consultant was supposed to give a presentation at the meeting – and other presentations on related topics were also on the agenda – but when a board member suggested finding certain paperwork (such as the last contract), it proved difficult to locate quickly. So most of the agenda wound up being tabled until the paperwork could be found.

The presentation was to be by Stephen L. Smith Corp.; he was to talk about the bond services his company provides, and the board was to consider contracting with him. They were also planning to consider contracting Stephen L. Smith Corp. to be the school district's financial consultants.

The board had also planned to consider contracting with Red Sky Constructors for construction management services, and with Kerr3 Design (who was to be available on the phone to answer any questions from the board) for architectural services.

Online Shopping Fundraiser Approved

Before the confusion over papers began, the board handled the rest of its business. Among these was approving a fundraiser that would create a virtual school store that would raise money for

the school.

Principal Michelle Shelite explained the concept to the board. The store is like an online shopping mall (www.SchoolStore.net) where parents or others can do their everyday shopping from the 400 stores affiliated with the site, such as Walmart, Sears, Target, Office Depot and Toys 'R' Us).

The school receives a percentage of the purchase amount and students can win prizes, according to the organization's website. Protecting the privacy of families as they support their school through online purchases is a priority for the organization, according to the organization itself.

Senior Trip Itinerary Approved

The board also approved the itinerary for the senior trip May 17-23. Students will leave Freedom at 3 a.m. on May 17, a Sunday, and arrive at the Washington, D.C., airport at 11:20 a.m. It will no doubt be a wild rush of a chaotic Sunday morning, but chances are the ride will continue wild until the troupe arrives back home from New York City on Saturday, May 23.

Other Board Business

The board also approved a bid from BancCentral of \$17,000 for 20 desktop computers.

The consent agenda was approved.

This included minutes of past meetings; the treasurer's report; encumbrances and warrants for the general, building, and child nutrition funds; and activity fund expenditures.

All board members were present: Shane Morris, Phil Kirkpatrick, Russell Reed, Shan Wilson and Robert Babcock. Also present were Superintendent Bryant Weber, Principal Michelle Shelite, and Minutes Clerk Patricia Dauphin.

Alfalfa County working to secure federal funds

A blanket of fog hovered over Cherokee Monday morning but it wasn't enough to deter the three Alfalfa County commissioners from making their 10 a.m. meeting. (The Federal Lands Access Program provides funds for projects on Federal Lands Access Transportation Facilities that are located on or adjacent to, or that provide access to Federal lands.)

Woodall has been working diligently to secure funding for repairs to Crystal Road in District 3 but working within the confines of governmental parameters has taken an inordinate amount of time. Commissioners Hague and Tucker



Waynoka school board purchases Church of God buildings for future day care center

Extends Superintendent Cline's contract for 3 years

At its regular monthly meeting Jan. 13, the Waynoka Board of Education approved the purchase of the Church of God building and parsonage on Maple Street.

"The plan is to use it as a community day care," said Superintendent Scott Cline the day after the board meeting. He said they hope to have it up and running by August, but they've got a lot to do to make that happen.

In executive session later in the meeting, the board discussed Superintendent Cline's employment and on return to open session voted to extend his contract for another three years.

Fundraisers, Textbook Committee Approved

The board approved two fundraiser requests at the early morning meeting, one for the academic team and one for athletics.

The academic team will sell T-shirts beginning today, Jan. 15, and continuing until Wednesday, Jan. 22. They hope to raise \$300 to pay for team dues.

The Waynoka slow pitch team will sell T-shirts, sweatshirts and hoodies in

February and March. Money raised will be used for jerseys, hats and pullovers.

The board also approved the textbook committee, consisting of administrator Dustin Smith, teachers Jordan Taylor and Alicia Pitts, and parent Renea Gaskill.

Board Adopts New or Amended Student Auto Policies

The board also voted to adopt three policies. Two have to do with students and their vehicles, and one is about the use of school property.

The Vehicle Use and Parking policy states that students can park and use their motor vehicles – but only on the high school campus. The vehicle has to be parked in a designated space, and they can't use their vehicles during the school day, with the only exceptions detailed in the next policy that was adopted. In an emergency, students can be given permission to use a vehicle.

"The school retains authority to conduct routine patrols of student parking lots and inspections of student automobiles when on school property," the policy states. "The interior of student vehicles may be inspected whenever a school authority has a reasonable

suspicion that illegal or unauthorized materials may be contained inside. Such patrols and inspections may be conducted without notice, without consent, and without a search warrant.

The other policy adopted at the meeting that regulates automobile use, lists all the conditions surrounding being able to park a vehicle at school. Students must register the vehicle with the school. They may not sit in, on, or "congregate around" vehicles during the school day. They may drive to lunch during the lunch period. When given permission by school administration, a student may drive a motor vehicle to other school-owned facilities during school hours. Students who break the rules will have their vehicle-use privileges suspended for five days. A second violation carries a 10-day suspension of driving privileges. A third violation will net a student a 90-day suspension of privileges.

Board Approves Policy Regulating Use of School Property

The last policy approved at the meeting is for Use of School Property (Regulations). To use school property, individuals must submit to the superintendent's office an application at least a week before they'll need the property.

No intoxicants can be used in or around school buildings or property, playing fields, or transportation equipment. No profanity, fighting, gambling or smoking is permitted.

School buildings, property, or equipment may be made available to student or non-student groups for non-curriculum

use of a general public interest during non-school hours. A lengthy schedule of fees has been drawn up; for example, non-school individuals could rent the kitchen and commons area for \$20 plus \$5 per hour (to cover custodial time and utilities)

Holly was involved in a number of





Police: Customer attacks manicurists for speaking Vietnamese

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — An angry Oklahoma City woman is accused of slapping a nail salon worker and punching and threatening another with a knife because the workers were speaking Vietnamese, police said Tuesday.

Candace Nicole Muzny, 43, was arrested on complaints of assault with a dangerous weapon and assault and battery on a police officer after the incident Sunday evening at the Creative Nail salon, said Oklahoma City police Sgt. Megan Morgan.

Muzny was getting a pedicure when one employee began speaking Vietnamese to another, at which point Muzny began yelling at the workers and slapped one in the face, according to a police report. When another employee tried to call police, she pulled out a pocket knife and punched him in the face, the report said.

Muzny was released from Oklahoma County jail Monday on \$20,000 bail. Formal charges have not been filed, and jail and court records don't indicate if Muzny has an attorney to speak on her behalf.

When a police officer tried to take Muzny into custody, the woman's dog began biting the officer's leg, and Muzny struck the officer behind the ear with the pocket knife, leaving him with a small cut, the report said.

New plates in Kansas will emphasize renewable energy

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP) — Kansas will begin issuing new personalized license plates Wednesday that emphasize the state's growing use of renewable energy.

The "Powering the Future" plates feature wind turbines profiled against a sunrise.

Wind-generated power in Kansas grew six-fold from 2009 to 2018, and a report last year said the state was the nation's top producer of wind energy, with more than 36% of total electricity coming from wind power, The Topeka Capital-Journal reported.

"I am pleased that this license plate design comes on the heels of Kansas being ranked first in the nation for percentage of electricity produced by wind," said Gov. Laura Kelly. "At the same time, it is a display of an expanding industry that contributes so much to the economic fabric of our state."

Residents can order the plates through their county treasurer's office for \$45.50, plus normal registration fees and taxes.



Governor says school chief should be appointed, not elected

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Oklahoma's governor wants the state's school superintendent to be appointed rather than elected, which would give the governor more power over public education.

Gov. Kevin Stitt did not specify if he wanted to appoint the position, or if he wanted the state Board of Education to make the decision. Stitt already appoints six of the seven board members, The Oklahoman reported.

Stitt told the newspaper that he's frustrated by his limited ability to affect education policy.

"When the governor's elected by all four million Oklahomans, the people think that he or she's supposed to be able to go in and make some different moves on education to get outcomes," Stitt said. "That's just common sense. That's what I thought when I was sitting in Tulsa in the business world. That's what people in Oklahoma think." Of

nearly 4 million Oklahomans, 644,579 voted for Stitt to become governor.

Rep. Melissa Provenzano, D-Tulsa, said allowing the governor to appoint the state superintendent could drastically shift the balance of power.

"I think as we continue to make improvements and get ourselves back on the right footing with the budget as well as with (education) policy, this would remove the voice of the people from that process," Provenzano said.

In 2013, Republican Sen. Greg Treat introduced legislation to consolidate appointment power under the governor. But it didn't make it to a statewide vote.

Treat still favors this idea, said spokesman Aaron Cooper.

"The current office holders are doing a fine job, but Senator Treat believes this model works well at the federal level and in other states and would work well in Okla-

homa, too," Cooper said.

The state's top public education official leads the state Department of Education and serves on the state board.

Stitt does not want any changes to affect Joy Hofmeister, Oklahoma's State Superintendent of Public Instruction, whose office declined to comment. She was elected to her final term in 2018.

In order to make the change, legislators would have to refer a constitutional amendment on a state ballot for voters to decide whether Oklahoma's state superintendent should be appointed instead of elected.

If residents are unhappy with the state of education in Oklahoma, they should consider giving the governor the power to reform the state's education system, Stitt said.

"I'm just trying to point out the hindrances, the reason that I believe that we're not performing up to where other states are," Stitt added.

A Place for Mom to hire more than 600 employees in Kansas

A Place for Mom, a senior care referral service, plans to hire more than 600 people in the next five years and build a new Overland Park office, the Seattle-based company announced Tuesday.

The company received about \$12 million in state incentives, The Kansas City Star reported.

A Place for Mom, which connects families with nursing homes and other senior care facilities, will open a temporary office

next week at the Overland Park Sprint campus. It plans to build a new office within the city.

The new employees will hold several jobs, including management, finance, human resources, information technology, local advisers, customer service and support staffers.

"We are committed to creating a world-class operation in the Kansas City area as we continue to transform our business

to best serve our customers," CEO Larry Kutscher said in a news release "Overland Park will be home to several key areas of our business that will have a direct impact on our company's mission to empower families to make informed and confident senior housing decisions that best fit their unique needs"

The Kansas Department of Commerce awarded the firm economic development incentives through seven state programs, said spokesman Ryan Brinker.

US-China pact signing to ease tension but leave much undone

WASHINGTON (AP) — After 18 months of economic combat, the United States and China are set to take a step toward peace Wednesday. At least for now.

President Donald Trump and China's chief negotiator, Liu He, are scheduled to sign a modest trade agreement in which the administration will ease some sanctions on China and Beijing will step up its purchases of U.S. farm products and other goods. Above all, the deal will defuse a conflict that has slowed global growth, hurt American manufacturers and weighed on the Chinese economy.

But the so-called Phase 1 pact does little to force China to make the major economic reforms — such as reducing unfair subsidies for its own companies — that the Trump administration sought when it started the trade war by imposing tariffs on Chinese imports in July 2018. The U.S. has yet to reveal details of the agreement, though U.S. Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer has said they would be made public Wednesday.

Most analysts say any meaningful resolution of the key U.S. allegation — that Beijing uses predatory tactics in its drive to supplant America's technological supremacy — could require years of contentious talks. And skeptics say a satisfactory resolution may be next to impossible given China's ambitions to become the global leader in such advanced technologies as driverless cars and artificial intelligence.

"The signing of the Phase 1 deal would represent a welcome, even if modest, de-escalation of trade hostilities between China and the U.S.," said Eswar Prasad, a Cornell University economist and former head of the International Monetary Fund's Chi-

na division. "But it hardly addresses in any substantive way the fundamental sources of trade and economic tensions between the two sides, which will continue to fester."

In a letter to Trump on Monday, the top Senate Democrat, Chuck Schumer of New York, complained that the Phase 1 deal appeared to make "very little progress in reforming China's rapacious trade behaviors and seems like it could send a signal to Chinese negotiators that the U.S. can be steamrolled."

The thornier issues are expected to be taken up in future rounds of negotiations. But it's unclear when they will begin. And few expect much progress before the November U.S. election.

"Phase 2 -- I wouldn't wait by the phone," said John Veroneau, who was a U.S. trade official in the George W. Bush administration and is now co-chair of the international trade practice at Covington & Burling. "That is probably a 2021 issue."

Under the Phase 1 agreement, which the two sides reached in mid-December, the administration dropped plans to impose tariffs on an additional \$160 billion in Chinese imports. And it halved, to 7.5%, existing tariffs on \$110 billion of goods from China.

For its part, Beijing agreed to significantly increase its purchases of U.S. products. According to the Trump administration, China is to buy \$40 billion a year in U.S. farm products — an ambitious goal for a country that has never imported more than \$26 billion a year in U.S. agricultural products.

The deal may be most notable for what it doesn't do. It leaves in place tariffs on about \$360 billion in Chinese imports — a level of protectionism that would have been unthinkable before Trump took office.

Chad Bown of the Peterson Institute for International Economics calculates that the Phase 1 agreement will leave nearly two-thirds of Chinese imports covered by Trump's tariffs. Beijing's retaliatory tariffs affect more than half of American exports to China. The average U.S. tariff on Chinese imports has risen from 3% in January 2018 to 21% now.

High tariffs between the world's two biggest economies, Bown says, are now "the new normal."

The Trump administration argues that the Phase 1 deal is a solid start that includes Chinese commitments to do more to protect intellectual property, curb the practice of forcing foreign companies to hand over sensitive technology and refrain from manipulating their currency lower to benefit Chinese exporters. In advance of the Phase 1 signing, in fact, the Treasury Department on Monday dropped its designation of China as a currency manipulator.

And by maintaining significant tariffs on Chinese imports, the administration retains leverage to force Beijing to abide by its commitments — something the United States says Beijing has failed to do for decades.

"We've never punished them before," said Derek Scissors, China specialist at the American Enterprise Institute. "If you don't have tariffs, you can write down anything you want, and the Chinese will cheat."

The administration contends that, however narrow the Phase 1 agreement may be, it represents a significant breakthrough.

"Across the board, it's a really, really good deal for the United States," Lighthizer told Fox Business Network on Monday. "And it will work if reformers in China want it to work. And if that happens, great. If it doesn't happen, (the pact) is fully enforceable... We expect them to live up to the letter of the law. We'll bring cases -- we'll bring actions against them if they don't."

Scissors said the trade war has already delivered a benefit for Trump, even if it hasn't forced Beijing to make major changes to its economic policy: Trump's tariffs have reduced Chinese exports to the United States and narrowed America's trade deficit with China.



Moody's downgrades debt rating for largest Boeing supplier

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) — Moody's Investors Service announced that it is downgrading the debt rating for Spirit AeroSystems, Inc. to junk-bond status after the major supplier of fuselages for Boeing's troubled 737 Max announced massive layoffs last week.

Monday's downgrade comes after Spirit announced Friday that it was laying off 2,800 workers in Wichita and that it planned smaller workforce reductions later this month at its plants in Tulsa and McAlester, Oklahoma.

"The downgrade reflects our expectation that Spirit's liquidity profile will quickly and materially erode in the absence of mitigating developments that remain largely out of the company's control," said Eoin Roche, Moody's lead analyst for Spirit.

Spirit produced about 70% of the 737 Max, including the fuselage and other major components. Contracts with Boeing for

the Max represents more than half of Spirit's annual income. Spirit halted production of fuselages and other parts for the Max on Jan. 1, after Boeing told Spirit to suspend shipments.

Moody's said recent events led it to assert that the company's earnings and cash generating capability had weakened meaningfully relative to historical trends and prior expectations, and would likely remain as such for at least the next two years. It said the layoffs suggest ongoing risk and operational disruption to what is now expected to be a much slower resumption of production.

The layoffs were announced the day after documents became public showing that Boeing employees raised doubts about the safety of the 737 Max, apparently tried to hide problems from federal regulators, and ridiculed those responsible for designing and overseeing the jetliner. The Max was grounded in March following two deadly crashes.

Spirit AeroSystems is the largest employer in Wichita, which bills itself as the "Air Capital of the World" due to a heavy concentration of aerospace manufacturers. More than 40 aerospace companies, most of them in and around Wichita, provide parts and services for the production of the 737 Max.

Kansas Secretary of Labor Delia Garcia on Tuesday released the state's "Aviation Worker Response" web page offering resources for workers affected by the halt in production. Garcia will be in Wichita on Thursday to listen to concerns and coordinate the state's response efforts out of the city's Workforce Alliance Center.

"My team will continue to work to connect impacted workers and businesses with the resources they need during this critical time," Gov. Laura Kelly said in a news release. "This information is an important first step as Secretary Garcia coordinates our comprehensive response effort."

The president has long lambasted the U.S. trade gap with Beijing as a sign of economic weakness, though many economists disagree. A wide trade deficit can actually reflect economic strength because it means that a nation's consumers feel prosperous and confident enough to spend freely — on imported goods as well as on home-grown goods.

So far this year, the U.S. deficit with China in the trade of goods has declined by 16%, or \$62 billion, to \$321 billion compared with a year earlier. And the deficit will narrow further if Beijing lives up to its

pledges to buy dramatically more American imports.

Trump's tariff hikes have proved to be a headwind for China's economy, which was already slowing, though the damage has been less than some forecasters expected. Chinese global exports eked out a 0.5% increase in 2019 despite a plunge in sales to the United States, according to Chinese customs data.

Chinese exporters responded to Trump's tariff hikes by shipping goods to the United States through other countries and by stepping up sales to Asia, Europe and Af-

rica. The government reported double-digit gains in 2019 exports to France, Canada, Australia, Brazil and Southeast Asia.

Economists said the tariff war slowed Chinese growth, which hit a multi-decade low of 6% in the quarter ending in September, by as little as 0.6 percentage point. Weak domestic demand and the cooling of a construction boom inflicted more damage.

"It is unrealistic for the U.S. government to think they could defeat China by exerting extreme pressure," said Tu Xinquan, director of the China Institute of WTO Studies at the University of International Business and Economics in Beijing. "As an economy with a massive size, China will gradually absorb such external shocks."

"China didn't get everything they wanted out of this deal, and the U.S. has obviously not got the structural changes in the Chinese economy they wanted," said Julian Evans-Pritchard of Capital Economics. "But they are going to get a substantial increase in exports and a reduction in the bilateral trade (deficit), which I think the Trump administration will clearly see as a win."





contain matter that “might tend to cause a breach of the peace; constitute subversive doctrine or seditious utterances or agitate for changes in our form of government or social order by violence or unlawful methods.”

Also in that policy: The vo-ag facilities can be leased, but the charge is \$100 per day. Those renting the facility must clean up afterward; feed must be

kept in barrels; manure must be taken by wheelbarrow to an area northwest of the barn, where it is to be scattered. Non-school individuals can only use the school’s stock trailers if they’ve gotten permission from the instructor and superintendent and if they’ll be using the trailer for a school-sponsored event.

The policy later states that the

school district “will rent property for the purpose of parking homes. Such rental will be to district employees only.”

Other Board Business

The board approved the consent agenda. This included the minutes of previous meetings, reports on the general, building, activity and bond funds, as well as encumbrances for the general, building and Bond #31 funds.

The board accepted Fry’s resignation as treasurer at the meeting Monday night. Fry said he and his wife Kay have lived in the same home in Kiowa for 53 years where they raised their two children. They’ve decided to move near their grown children, “five grandkids and five great-grandkids, and be a part of the family life.” Fry said they’ve bought a home in Moore (near Oklahoma City). The remodeling should be ready for them to move in by April, he said.

“We’re going to miss this town. We love it,” Fry said of Kiowa.

New Board Members at Table, All Honored for Service

January is School Board Recognition Month, which Superintendent Miller said a great opportunity to say thank you to the South Barber board “who are committed to the success of every student in our community.”

At this January board meeting, new members Jenna Mostert and Emily Lohmann, both mothers of young children, took their seat at the board table for the first time.

Other board members that Superintendent Miller recognized for their years of service are: President Mark Pollock, seven years; Vice President Bryan Quick, 13 years; Deborah Helfrich, 20 years; Ryan Molz, one year; and Mike Miller (who was absent) three years. Board Clerk Julie Johnson and Superintendent Miller also sat at the board table.

“Our board members develop policies and make complex decisions

that shape the future of our education system. They are accountable for an annual budget of \$5.7 million, 233 students, 54 employees and 2 buildings,” the superintendent said.

“They also meet with legislators and other policy makers to advocate for our schools to make sure every child has access to an excellent education. We are grateful to have this opportunity to formally say ‘thank you’ to each of them,” Miller said.

More South Barber Board Business

Payment of current bills totaling \$359,524.50 received board approval.

President Pollock also represents South Barber on the South Central Kansas Special Education Cooperative (SCKSEC). He said the cooperative plans to meet at Haskins (which was the Behavioral Center) in Sharon to see what they are looking at whether it be a remodel or different option. Pollock said he is interested in considering some less costly options.

Board members discussed possible action concerning reorganization of the district board assignments to at-large positions. For now though, the board decided to leave the assignments as they are currently – District I and II.

After discussion, the board approved using an “activity” credit card for the high school with a limit of \$2,500. This is for organizations like FFA, FCCLA, IA, vocal, band, etc., who need to make a purchase online when only a credit card will be accepted. The funds would come from the organization. Kay Roberts, who

is in charge of activity funds, would oversee these transactions.

South Barber Student Achievements and More News

Dr. Miller said the new bleachers for the gym are on a scheduled timeline. The players and coaches will sit on the visitor side with the scoring table on that side.

South Barber’s grant for the storm shelter/large room was approved by FEMA for the federal funding.
