Kiowa City Council talks water project, eyesore properties, liquor sales and more

SCTelcom wants new location; Barber County Extension promotes economic development

Kiowa's City Council had a full agenda at their June 14 meeting with guest speakers and lots of new business items. As Mayor Bill Watson opened the meeting council and the audience rose to salute the flag. Then Councilmember R.L. Simpson gave a prayer.

Other councilmembers present were: B.J. Duvall, Brian Hill, Jason Thayer and Tom Wells. City Administrator Sam Demel, City Attorney Brandon Ritcha and City Clerk Kade Tucker also sat at the council table.

Demel Updates on Water Project, Burn Site, Eyesore Properties

Demel gave an update on the waterline replacement project ongoing throughout Kiowa. He said that the waterlines that have been laid were pressure tested. It won't be long and those lines will soon be hooked into the new water system. He was referring to the area NOWAK Construction has been and is currently digging and laying the blue pipe on the north side of town. As NOWAK tears up streets to replace waterline, they will replace with concrete, Demel said.

The council approved this month's payment to NOWAK for \$340,610.41.

The group led by local businessman Jeff Bryan in conjunction with the city and private donors is moving forward in their effort to rid Kiowa of structural

eyesores around town. Demel told the council the man who owned the old hospital building had no plans for the building. Demel agreed to sign a deed for the old hospital property to go to the city. Council voted to accept and file the deed to the old hospital. That building that is in disrepair, is first on the list to be destroyed.

"We'll get anything (like electrical boxes) we can that we could use," Demel said. The bricks from the building will be the city's property. Demel said the city will share bricks with the public. Some of the leftover bricks could be used to expand the burn site, he said. Kiowa's City crew will help with demolition as will Gorilla Construction owned by Eric Molz and Jeff Bryan's crew from his car dealership, etc. This will be funded in thirds by the city; private donors; and the property owners who will reportedly have an incentive to help. Anyone who wishes to contribute financially is asked to take their donation to the City of Kiowa office on Main Street.

Demel updated the council on the city's burn site. During June and July he's keeping the site open on Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Sundays from 1 to 6 p.m. He said the city is posting signs that tell Kiowa residents to put grass clippings in a separate pile – not in the wood pile.

The council agreed to purchase 400 tons of 3/8 rock chip from Gorilla Construction. Council voted to go

with Circle C Paving for a chip and seal project for \$1.79 per sq yard. Total cost is projected to be approximately \$95,225.

More Kiowa Business, Liquor Sales Allowed by 9 a.m. on Sundays

The Kansas Department of Revenue put out a notice regarding recent Kansas legislation in the form of a house bill. This allows liquor stores to start selling liquor at 9 a.m. on Sundays instead of at noon. Kiowa's local liquor store requested the city pass an ordinance so the change of time will be legal. City Attorney Brandon Ritcha said that Kiowa's ordinance will mirror the state's.

Demel said the city needs an electrical intern. The intern needs to put in 400 hours of training here and then can finish training online. Demel said he is setting up an interview with a candidate.

KMEA did not waive the interest fee for the City of Kiowa when they did not pay their unusually exorbitant electricity bill from the arctic blast in February. That interest amount is \$1,852.83.

City officials are already making plans to run Kiowa's generator in peak times of heat this summer if needed. Council also had plans to meet with a solar representative online.

The Chief Theater needs to replace their projector which is used to download all the movies, etc. The original bill for a used replacement was about \$12,900. Demel researched further and found a projector for

What happens when someone hacks your social media account?

When two deputy sheriffs come into the newspaper office to ask if we know someone, it gets our attention. Turns out they were looking for an employee's son to ask him some questions. Our employee was able to help them with some answers.



The young man's Facebook account was hacked about four months ago. It wasn't one of those things where someone clones your account, using your photo and name and then tries to get your friends to friend the cloned account. When that happens, it's time to change your Facebook password.

However, in this case someone completely took over the young man's account, changing the email address and password associated with the account. Then this unknown individual proceeded to post "contests" inviting his friends and followers to text back the time of the posting or the wording of a posted sign. It promised the first 10 or 20 or whatever number of responses would receive \$50 or maybe \$500. The numbers changed on each posting.

Of course, those who replied never received any money. Instead they were asked to supply a PayPal account or some other information to get the money. That information could then be used for other scams. (If it sounds too good to be true ...)

Our employee took some screen shots (photos) of the fake contests and tried several times to get Facebook to remove the hacked account to no avail.

Apparently someone complained to the Woods County Sheriff's Office about her son trying to scam people, and the deputies were following up. Maybe they

can convince Facebook to take down the fake account. I wish them luck.

The deputies said they're also receiving complaints from residents receiving strange text messages. I and others in the office have received them, too. The first time I received one of those group texts, I was intrigued to see one of the phone numbers listed belonged to my deceased husband.

At first, I tried blocking phone numbers listed. But I hated to block too many because the scammer was using local cellphone numbers. I might unintentionally block someone I didn't want to block.

I did a little research and saw I could do a mass block of any number not in my saved list of phone numbers, but that wasn't really practical either.

The deputies said these group text messages are really upsetting some people. The messages invite people to click on a link to view photos with promises they'll enjoy them, suggesting unclothed females. The deputies didn't really have any answers either. When I receive such messages, I just delete them.

Whatever you do about them, do not click on the provided link. That could allow someone to put a virus or some unwanted app on your phone.

A Scary Experience

Last week, I had a call from a Newsgram reader who had an experience related to another aspect of the Internet. Robert Hayes of Aline said he was visiting a friend who lives in Lawton. The lady lives in a high-crime part of Lawton but owns her home there and can't move away.

As the two of them were relaxing on the front porch, they saw a young girl in her teens walking along the street. She came up to them and asked to make a phone call. The girl was obviously upset.

With a lot of encouragement, she told them she met a man online and agreed to meet him in person. He came to her small town and picked her up. Hayes said she told them the man "had his way with her" and then threw her out in Lawton. When asked her age, she told them she was 18, but they were skeptical because she looked much younger.

Hayes and his friend offered to drive the girl to her home, which turned out to be about 40 miles away. They left her there at the home of a relative.

Hayes wanted us to relay his story as a warning to people, especially underage people, to be very careful when meeting people on the internet.

Notes from Alva City Council

On a completely different topic, Monday night's Alva City Council meeting was very long with 34 items on the agenda.

Councilmember Mary Hamilton announced this will be her last meeting. She has served Ward 3 since Mayor Kelly Parker asked her to fill a vacancy on the council, retaining her seat through elections. Hamilton prepared some remarks in announcing her resignation which will be reported later this week in the Alva Review-Courier. She hopes to devote more of her time to attending and enjoying activities involving her grandchildren.

It will now be up to Mayor Parker to find someone to fill the vacant council seat. That appointment will require approval from the city council.

The council members voted to adopt the International *Existing* Building Code Monday night. The city adopted the International Building Code several years ago. Monday night's action gives owners some options when remodeling and adding on to existing buildings. It's hoped this will make Alva more business-friendly. The new code will take effect in 30 days from June 21.

Another interesting item reported by Finance Committee Chairman Brandon Sherman is the amount of money the City of Alva will be paying for a state audit. This is a "citizens' petition audit" by the office of the State Auditor and Inspector. A petition was circulated and signed by enough people that the state agreed to audit the city, but the city has to pay for it. So far it has cost \$12,976 not including a May visit. It's estimated it will cost Alva about \$65,000 by the end of the audit. That doesn't include all the time spent by staff researching answers to questions.

Wonder how much street paving \$65,000 would provide?

Burlington School awaits DHS approval for daycare

Burlington School Board President Terry Graham called the regular monthly meeting to order June 17 at 8 a.m., with four board members present including: Robert Hill, April Kisling and Aaron Smith. T.J. Rockenbach was absent. Also attending were Dr. Stacey Croft, superintendent for the 2020-2021 school year; Kevin Brown, superintendent for the 2021-2022 school year; Gerrett Spears, high school principal for the 2021-2022 school year; and Minutes Clerk Tracy Granados.

Because of the need for daycare services, Burlington is opening one in the church building that was the First Christian Church and now owned by the Driftwood Christian Church. It's located barely a block west of the school. Megan Ferrell is the new daycare director. She is completing additional needed trainings and also furnishing the new daycare. She's preparing for the final DHS walk-through. Outgoing Superintendent Dr. Stacey Croft told the Newsgram how many children they will be licensed for is up to the DHS. The daycare's opening date also hinges on the DHS.

The board approved the additional encumbrances and payments for the June Daycare payroll.

Dr. Croft presented a letter of resignation from secretary Brenda Stricker and thanked her for her work

at the school. The board approved Stricker's resignation.

Giving a utility comparison for the past year, Dr. Croft noted that the colder weather had increased heating costs this year.

The superintendent reminded the board of the upcoming OSSBA Conference August 26 - 29 in Oklahoma City. All board members, the superintendent and principal are registered for the conference.

At 9:18 a.m. a motion was made to convene in executive session pursuant to 25 O.S. Section 307(B)(1) for the purpose of discussing the ongoing performance of the superintendent. President Graham explained it's just a routine monthly discussion of the superintendent. Since the new superintendent should not yet be evaluated and Dr. Croft is retiring at the end of June, there was no need to evaluate either one. He said the Burlington School Board is in a system of continual superintendent evaluation. They kept this on the agenda as a general discussion of how to proceed on evals, Graham explained.

Principal Gerrett Spears said that staff was busy preparing for the start of the 2021-2022 school year. The handbook is being updated and schedules are in preparation for enrollment in the fall. Additionally, the basketball teams have attended summer camps: the JH

Boys attended a camp at Cherokee; the HS Boys attended camps at Alva and Okarche; the HS Girls attended a camp at Keifer and will be headed to one at Oklahoma City University. Spears said FFA students attended the Oklahoma Leadership Conference in Oklahoma City.

An Array of Burlington Public School Business

The board approved the insurance quote from OSIG for \$72,416. Dr. Croft presented OSIG's quote for the 2021-2022 school year. She noted that the current quote did not include the Burlington property at 702 6th Ave, but that OSIG was working on adding it.

A quote from Triple G Fence, LLC for \$9,400 for fencing at school properties located at 205 Main Street and 503 Myrtle Street received board approval.

Approved by the board was a motion to reserve from the 2020/2021 General fund \$49,266.37 and Building fund \$13,377.55 for purchases and projects approved by the board for which invoices have not yet been received.

The board approved Burlington school's minimum teacher salary schedule and superintendent salary for the 2021-2022 school year. No action was taken on salaries for support staff at this time. The minimum teacher salary is based on the different levels of teaching.

The following encumbrances, change order and warrants were board approved as follows: General Fund: Encumbrances 274-291 for \$21,825.24; Changes orders for \$652.55 and Warrants 1127-1193 for \$111,418.66; Building Fund: Encumbrances 6-8 for \$33,820.90 and Warrants 16-19 for \$169,161.94; Child Nutrition: Change orders for (-\$157.31) and Warrant 158 for \$58.44.

Board approval went to the May 2021 Activity Fund Report and many more actions including: renewal of membership of Edmond's new Prime Vendor Agreement with US Foods (RFP 321-30) for 2021-2022; the contract with MAS for the 2021--2022 school year in the amount of \$6,300.00

Background checks blocked a record high 300,000 gun sales

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The number of people stopped from buying guns through the U.S. background check system hit an all-time high of more than 300,000 last year amid a surge of firearm sales, according to new records obtained by the group Everytown for Gun Safety.

The FBI numbers provided to The Associated Press show the background checks blocked nearly twice as many gun sales in 2020 as in the year before. About 42% of those denials were because the would-be buyers had felony convictions on their records.

The increase in blocked gun sales largely tracks with the record-setting surge in sales that took hold along with the coronavirus pandemic and has continued into this year, through historic demonstrations against police brutality, deep political divisions and an insurrection at the U.S. Capitol.

It comes as Congress has failed to pass major legislation on guns despite the Democratic majority and President Joe Biden's push. A bill that would strengthen background checks is stalled in the Senate. The House in March passed the legislation requiring the checks on all sales and transfers, as well as an expanded 10-day review for gun purchases. Most states require background checks only for sales at federally licensed dealers. But the legislation faces an uphill battle getting any Republican support in the Senate.

According to the data, the rate of barred would-be gun buyers also increased somewhat over the previous two years, from about 0.6% to 0.8%. That could be in part because many of the people who tried to get guns in 2020 were buying them for the first time and may not have been aware that they were legally barred from owning them, said Adam Winkler, a UCLA Law professor specializing in gun policy.

"Some may have a felony conviction on their record and not think about it," he said.

Making a false statement in connection with a background check is a felony punishable by up to 10 years in prison and a hefty fine, but few people are prosecuted for what would amount to lying on

the form filled out before a gun purchase, he said.

In 2017, just 12 of the 112,000 people denied a gun purchase, about 0.01%, were federally prosecuted, largely due to limited resources for the time-intensive investigations, according to a U.S. Government Accountability Office report.

Everytown's research found that 16% of would-be gun buyers in 2020 were prohibited by state law, like the extreme-risk protection orders or red-flag laws passed in several states. Another 12% were related to domestic violence, either people subject to a protective order or convicted of a misdemeanor domestic violence crime.

The data shows how necessary the legislation is, said Sarah Burd-Sharps, Everytown's director of research.

"There's no question that background checks work, but the system is working overtime to prevent a record number of people with dangerous prohibitors from being able to buy firearms," she said in a statement. "The loopholes in the law allow people to avoid the system, even if they just meet online or at a gun show for the first time."

Gun rights groups have pushed back

against the proposal, and Alan Gottlieb, founder of the group the Second Amendment Foundation, said the increase in denials might be partly because more states have been updating their records of restricted people. There are sometimes false positives as well, he said. "A day doesn't go by that our office doesn't get complaint calls from people who've been denied wrongly," he said.

The data also comes as a growing number of conservative-leaning states drop requirements for people to get background checks and training to carry guns in public.

Texas last week became the latest state of about 20 to drop permitting requirements amid a push that began gathering steam several years ago. Gun rights groups say those requirements are an unfair burden for law-abiding gun owners, but firearm safety groups worry it's a dangerous trend that will allow more firearms in the wrong hands.





Cherokee resident charged in recent burglaries

The Cherokee Police Department has arrested a suspect in several recent burglaries of vehicles.

Jarred Rashad Munson, 24, of Cherokee, has been charged with first degree burglary in a case where he entered a garage to break into a vehicle. He is also facing two third degree burglary charges for other vehicle break-ins. All three are felony charges.

First degree burglary carries a penalty of imprisonment for seven to 20 years. Third degree burglary is punishable by imprisonment for up to five years.

In addition, Munson has been charged with unlawful possession of drug paraphernalia and with petit larceny, both misdemeanors. The petit larceny charge involves the theft of a bicycle. The drug paraphernalia charge is punishable by imprisonment for up to one year or a fine of up to \$1,000 or both. Petit larceny is punishable by imprisonment for up to six months or a fine of \$10 to \$500 or both.

As of Tuesday morning, Munson was being held in the Alfalfa County Jail with a \$50,000 bond required for release.

Court records show on June 14, Cherokee Police Chief Ryan McNeil was advised that a possible suspect

was residing in the 800 block of S. Massachusetts Ave. and that the stolen property from several burglaries was at that location. The information said an employee had come into work at the Sonic Drive-in and told others that the guns stolen in recent burglaries were in her house and that there was a stolen bicycle in her back yard. That employee was identified as a relative of Munson.

McNeil and Officer Tristan Hall went to the address and observed a bicycle sitting alongside the north side of the residence that matched the description of one reported stolen. McNeil then talked with the resident, Tracy Yearta, who confirmed she had told others about the guns and stolen bicycle at work that morning. She also stated Munson had been in the house but he had fled out of the back door when the officers knocked on the front door. Yearta explained Munson had recently moved into the house from Kentucky, and the only thing that belonged to Munson in the house was a backpack.

Yearta took McNeil inside and pointed out a Mario Brothers backpack sitting on the floor behind a couch. Inside the backpack, McNeil found two firearms, a Glock 43X with a serial number matching one stolen from a vehicle on May 28, and a Cimarron .357 revolver that was reported stolen

on June 2.

Further items found in the backpack included a Remington Rand .45 1911 pistol, stolen from a vehicle in Cherokee which was parked in an attached garage; an Apple iPhone in a black Otter Box case which was stolen from a vehicle on June 2; one glass smoking device with unknown residue inside; and one black and red colored marijuana pipe with burnt residue inside.

Personal items in the backpack including clothing and personal care items were inventoried and returned to the backpack.

Munson was located and apprehended by Officer Hall in the area of 11th and Pennsylvania where he was taken into custody without incident. Munson was transported to the Alfalfa County Jail where he was advised of his Miranda Rights. Munson waived those rights in writing.

According to the affidavit, Munson admitted to entering several vehicles to steal property including one vehicle which was parked inside an attached garage while the victim and his wife were asleep inside the residence. Munson stated he had been frustrated with his financial situation and he intended to sell the stolen property for money.

McNeil requested a criminal record check on Munson which showed he has several felony convictions involving burglary in theft in 2018.

Munson's next court appearance is scheduled for July 7.

Cherokee man charged with burglary of house he used to own

A preliminary investigation into a trespassing complaint showed the alleged trespasser was listed as the property owner on county assessor records. It was learned later, he had signed the property over to his ex-wife.

Cherokee Police Chief Ryan McNeil responded to a report of trespassers on Friday, June 11, about 9:15 a.m. According to court records, Allison Bigbey said her ex-husband, Christopher Burney York, had broken into her residence on South Grand Ave. McNeil learned the Alfalfa County Assessor's Office listed York as the property owner.

McNeil spoke with York at the property and did not observe any damage to doors. York stated that he was there to cut the grass and did have a lawn mower in the back of his vehicle. Since York was listed as the property owner, McNeil took no enforcement action.

McNeil later spoke to Bigbey who stated York had signed the property over to her. She was able to provide a copy of a quitclaim deed signed by York on March 25, 2021, in which ownership of the property was signed over to Bigbey by York. Additionally Bigbey provided a handwritten note dated March 5, 2021, alleged to have been written by York that explained his wish to transfer ownership of the property to Bigbey.

Regarding the property, Bigbey said the door on the west side of the residence had been damaged. She stated the door had not been damaged prior to this incident. Bigbey provided photographs of the door showing damage to the door frame, damage to the door handle lock and pieces of the door on the interior floor near the door. According to McNeil's affidavit, the damage appeared to be caused by someone using some type of tool to force the door open.

In addition, Bigbey provided McNeil

with two photographs that showed York standing outside of the damaged door and also standing inside of the residence. Bigbey provided a video that shows York forcing the door open. The photographs and video were taken by someone who works in the office located to the south of the residence.

Bigbey stated she did not find anything missing from the residence which she uses to store her personal belongings. She said she was concerned for the safety of both herself and her child due to York's actions, adding that York had repeatedly shown up at her current residence in Garfield County after being told to stop coming around her and her child.

On June 17 in Alfalfa County, Christopher Burney York, 43, of Cherokee, was charged with burglary in the second degree. This crime is punishable by imprisonment for up to seven years.

Stein reminds voters to allow time for an absentee ballot to be received, completed, and returned by mail to the County Election Board. "With some exceptions, all absentee ballots must be notarized before being returned. Voters should give themselves plenty of time to make sure all steps have been followed and that the ballot is returned correctly in order to be counted," Stein said.

Voters exempt from having a ballot notarized include those who are physically incapacitated, those who care for physically incapacitated individuals that cannot be left alone, and voters confined to nursing homes. Those voters may opt to have their ballot witnessed by two people.

Military personnel and residents living overseas, along with their spouses and dependents are also eligible for certain allowances. Military personnel should contact Voting Service Officers in their units for absentee application forms. Residents living overseas may obtain absentee voting applications from any United States military installation or United States Embassy or Consulate. Military personnel and overseas citizens who are already registered voters in Oklahoma may apply for absentee ballots using the OK Voter Portal at oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp. Those who need to complete a new Voter Registration Application should apply through the Federal Voting Assistance Program at FVAP.gov.

All completed absentee ballots must be in the hands of the County Election Board no later than 7 p.m. on Election Day.

Also, sample ballots are now available for the July 13 election. Voters can download a sample ballot using the State

Election Board's OK Voter Portal at oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp or pick up a copy at the Alfalfa County Election Board located at 602 W. 5th St., Ste 3, Cherokee, during normal business hours.

Stein reminds voters that sample ballots are specific to each person.

"If the OK Voter Portal indicates that you have no sample ballots available, it means you are not eligible to vote in an upcoming election. We recommend checking the OK Voter Portal to make sure you have an election before heading to the polls."

Stein said sample ballots will also be posted outside every precinct polling place on Election Day, so voters can review them before casting their votes.

Commissioners in Alfalfa County award bids

At Monday’s meeting, the commissioners of Alfalfa County spent some time reviewing and awarding six-month bids. Marvin Woodall, Jay Hague and Mike Roach considered availability, quality and cost to determine the awards. With steel, availability was the big issue.

Besides an executive session (no action was subsequently taken) to discuss maintenance and custodial positions, most of the agenda was basic housekeeping items that were approved:

- Previous meeting minutes, blanket purchase orders, and maintenance and operation payment warrants.
- A revised resolution directing

deposit of reimbursement of election board expenses for FY 2021-22.

- A Certificate of Compliance and compliance letter for Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority businesses for OMMA and Dakota Industries.
- A transfer of Funds for an error correction from County General Insurance account 0001-1-2000-1222 to the EM 0001-2- 2700-1110 and Court Clerk 0001-1-1400-1110 Personal Services accounts.
- A transfer from the Assessor M&O account 0001-1-1600-2005 to the Assessor Travel 0001-1-1600-1310 account for employee training travel.
- A resolution to execute the agreement establishing ACCO-SIG with Alfalfa County. (The commissioners

opted to break it up into two payments.)

- A programming resolution for District 2 for ER NS 2550 at EW 0315 DDIR 0820-02-01.
- A resale property fund financial statement.
- The IT services agreement between Alfalfa County and CLGT & AF3 Technical Solutions, LLC for FY 2021-22.
- Professional Legal Services Contract with Alfalfa County and Tisdal & O’Hara PLLC for FY 2021-22.

Last week, the commissioners talked about making a slight modification to verbiage in the 2021 employee handbook. This week, they approved adding “FMLA” following “workman’s comp” to pay insurance on page 31.

Woods County commissioners approve insurance, contracts

The Woods County commissioners tackled mostly routine business during Monday’s meeting. They approved a number of annual contracts and agreements.

District 2 Commissioner Randy McMurphy chaired the meeting with District 1 Commissioner David Hamil and District 3 Commissioner John Smiley present.

Workers compensation insurance from ACCO-SIF for the next fiscal year will cost \$59,944. County Clerk Shelley Reed said it’s about the same amount as last year. The cost for Woods County property and liability insurance from ACCO-SIG is \$133,703 which is

an increase. McMurphy said the extra cost was mostly due to “getting things insured like they’re supposed to be.”

Woods County Enhanced 911 is required to have a separate property and liability insurance policy. That ACCO-SIG insurance is \$4,755 for fiscal year 2021-2022.

Commissioner approved the FY21-22 contract with County Budgeting Services, LLC in the amount of \$7,500. They approved another County Budgeting Services, LLC contract for the Health Department for \$1,350.

A contract with TM Consulting Inc. for the Woods County Health Department for software for the next fiscal year was approved in the amount

of \$15,000.

Two transfers of appropriations were approved. Both District 1 and District 2 will have transfers from Highway CIRB to Highway personal service in the amount of \$22,594.08 each. CIRB (county improvements for roads and bridges) funds come from motor vehicle taxes.

The monthly report from the sheriff’s office was approved including collections of \$2,526.39 and expenses of \$4,193.08.

The commissioners also approved blanket purchase orders.

Under new business, Smiley asked some questions about buying rock for use in road work. The company where he intended to purchase the rock inadvertently did not submit a new six month bid. The commissioners haven’t approved those bids yet, so Reed told him he had a few days to buy the rock on the old bid price.

Biden urges shots for young adults as variant concern grows

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. government is stepping up efforts to get younger Americans vaccinated for COVID-19 as the White House acknowledges it will miss two key vaccination benchmarks and as concern grows about the spread of a new variant that threatens to set the country back in the months ahead.

The delta variant, first identified in India, in the last two weeks has come to represent more than 20% of coronavirus infections in the U.S., the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported Tuesday. That's double what it was when the CDC last reported on the variant's prevalence.

"The delta variant is currently the greatest threat in the U.S. to our attempt to eliminate COVID-19," Dr. Anthony Fauci, the nation's top infectious disease expert, said at a White House briefing on the virus. "Good news: Our vaccines are effective against the delta variant."

He added: "We have the tools. So let's use them, and crush the outbreak."

The White House on Tuesday acknowledged that President Joe Biden will fall short of reaching his goal of vaccinating 70% of all American adults with at least one shot by Independence Day. But it tried to paint an optimistic picture nonetheless by stressing that the nation had reached that threshold for those aged 30 and older and expects to meet it for those age 27 or older by the July 4 holiday.

Biden also expects to miss a second goal — fully vaccinating 165 million adult Americans by July 4. White House COVID-19 coordinator Jeff Zients pro-

jected it will take several more weeks to hit that number. On Monday, the U.S. crossed 150 million fully vaccinated.

White House press secretary Jen Psaki rejected the idea that the missed July 4 benchmarks would represent a failure for the administration, telling reporters, "We don't see it exactly like something went wrong."

Still, administration officials said they were redoubling their focus on vaccinating younger Americans age 18-26, who have proved to be least likely to get a vaccine when it's available for them.

The nationwide rate of new vaccinations has dropped off precipitously over the past month even as shots have become more available, with fewer than 300,000 Americans now getting their first dose per day on average — a pace that, if sustained, will have the U.S. not reaching Biden's 70% goal until late July at the earliest.

Officials are also increasingly concerned about regional variations in the vaccination program.

More than 16 states and the District of Columbia have vaccinated 70% of their adult population. But others — particularly in the South and Midwest — are lagging substantially behind, with four not having yet reached 50% vaccination rates.

The White House said meeting Biden's vaccination goals is less important than the pace of the nation's reopening, which is exceeding even its own internal projections as the overwhelming majority of the nation's most vulnerable people are fully vaccinated and cases and deaths are at their lowest rates since the earliest days of the pandemic, averaging about 11,000 new infections and fewer than 300 deaths per day. More states are opening back up, with Michigan on Tuesday becoming the latest to do away with a mask mandate and virus restrictions. The state had the nation's worst outbreak this spring.

"We have succeeded beyond our

highest expectations," Zeints said.

Americans at highest risk for complications from COVID-19 are overwhelmingly vaccinated, according to CDC data, but only 53% aged 25-39 have received one dose. Among those 18-24, it's 47%.

"Where the country has more work to do is particularly with 18 to 26 year olds," Zients said.

Zients and government experts said the rise of the delta variant should motivate younger Americans to get vaccinated.

"The reality is many younger Americans have felt like COVID-19 is not something that impacts them, and they've been less eager to get the shot," Zients said. "However, with the delta variant now spreading across the country, and infecting younger people worldwide, it's more important than ever that they get vaccinated."

The variant is taking root as there are warning signs about a possible surge in cases in unvaccinated corners of America. Rural sections of Missouri, including Springfield and Branson, have seen a dramatic spike in COVID-19 hospitalizations in recent weeks that health officials attribute in part to the delta variant spreading among younger, unvaccinated residents.

"There is a danger, a real danger that if there is a persistence of a recalcitrance to getting vaccinated that you could see localized surges," said Fauci.

Mississippi, Louisiana, Wyoming, Alabama and Idaho are all below 40% of their population with at least one dose of vaccine.

The White House planned to focus on increasingly local vaccination pushes, with first lady Jill Biden traveling Tuesday to Mississippi and Tennessee to promote vaccinations and Biden himself set to visit North Carolina on Thursday.

The variant is accounting for half of new infections in the regions that include Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Colorado, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah and Wyoming.

Should reporters challenge or ignore election disbelievers?

NEW YORK (AP) — Matt Negrin's campaign to ban "election deniers" from television news failed to achieve his original goal, which was to prevent a significant number of Americans from believing the lie that Donald Trump didn't lose the presidential election to Joe Biden.

Instead, it has provoked a persistent debate over the role of political journalists, along with illustrating how television news and the politicians who depend upon its cameras have changed.

Negrin, a former journalist and now producer at Comedy Central's "The Daily Show," wrote a December column for The Washington Post saying that TV journalists who invite Republicans on the air should begin by asking if they believed Biden won the election. If they don't say yes, the interview should end.

He's aggressively continued the effort on his personal Twitter account, saying mainstream news programs that book officeholders who voted against accepting election results are helping to spread misinformation.

Many in the news business believe that stance goes too far, that a journalist's role is to question ideas and point out inaccuracies or outright fictions, not to pretend they don't exist. Two Sunday morning hosts, Jake Tapper and Chris Wallace, recently revealed themselves as polar opposites on the point.

While it's not a formal policy, Tapper said he hasn't booked election deniers on CNN's "State of the Union" and on his weekday show, "The Lead."

"It's a discussion I think everyone in the news media should be having," Tapper told Politico. "Should those who shared the election lie that incited the deadly attack on

the Capitol and that continues to erode confidence in our democracy be invited onto our airwaves to continue to spread the Big Lie? Can our viewers count on these politicians to tell the truth about other topics?"

Wallace, of "Fox News Sunday," has said he's willing to talk to all sides and has no rules about the order of questions. "I don't think moral posturing goes well with newsgathering," Wallace said in a statement last month.

When Florida Sen. Rick Scott appeared on his show Feb. 28, Wallace asked whether Biden won the election "fair and square." Absolutely, Scott replied.

Led by Trump, suspicion about the 2020 results has remained, despite elections officials calling it secure and the dismissal of court challenges. A Quinnipiac University poll taken six months after the election found 29% of Americans, and 66% of Republicans surveyed said Biden was not legitimately elected.

Confronting deniers is not a subject many in the business are eager to address publicly. No one on NBC's "Meet the Press," ABC's "This Week" or CBS' "Face the Nation," for example, would speak to The Associated Press about it.

What would Tim Russert do? The former "Meet the Press" host was the acknowledged king of Sunday morning political talk shows before his death in 2008, and his former producer said Russert believed in exposing ideas that many found repugnant. Russert memorably interviewed former KKK leader David Duke in 1991.

But Betsy Fischer Martin, executive producer of "Meet the Press" from 2002 to 2013, wonders how many such opportunities exist now. In today's climate, many politicians prefer friendly TV venues, like

Fox News for conservatives or MSNBC for liberals.

"It's human nature in many ways that you want to pick a program that is going to give you more of a platform than a tough interview," said Fischer Martin, executive director of the Women in Politics Institute at American University.

Booking deniers is less of an issue when many don't want to be booked in the first place.

The current "Meet the Press" moderator, Chuck Todd, alluded to this while writing for Politico in January. A handful of GOP senators make themselves available for interviews, he wrote, but they're few and far between.

Unless they need to reach a broader electorate, many Republican officeholders don't see the point of such faceoffs, said Alex Conant, a GOP consultant and founding partner of Firehouse Strategies in Washington.

"If you're a conservative, the truth is, you don't care too much about liberal voters," Conant said. "They're never going to support you, and there's not much benefit to subjecting yourself to a tough interview."

Frank Sesno, a former CNN Washington bureau chief, lands on the side of interviewing deniers. Yet he wonders whether that would be worthwhile if questions are ignored, talking points spouted or empty fights instigated.

"It's not a question of banning them," said Sesno, professor at George Washington University. "You just don't want them on the air because they're not going to be a good guest."

Some recent interviews prove his point.

ABC News' Terry Moran grew exasperated last month in repeatedly and fruitlessly asking GOP spokesman Paris Dennard whether he accepted the results of the 2020 election as legitimate. "It's a yes or no question," Moran said.

Biden was president, Dennard said. He wouldn't go further. Moran kept trying, asking whether he was scared to answer or didn't believe democracy worked last November.

"You can be an American citizen who can accept the fact that Joe Biden is presi-

Oklahoma man arrested for threatening Biden, Congress

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — A Tulsa man is facing federal charges after federal prosecutors say he threatened to kill President Joe Biden, members of Congress and their families.

Acting U.S. Attorney Clint Johnson says 58-year-old John Jacobs Ahrens was charged Monday with making threats against the president.

Johnson says Ahrens sent a series of emails to a Tulsa television station threatening to murder Biden, members of Congress and their families if he didn't receive money.

"Making online threats to murder public officials and their families has consequences," Johnson said in a statement. "The arrest and filing of criminal charges

is the first step in holding individuals accountable for their alleged actions."

Ahrens was arrested at his home in Tulsa last week and allegedly admitted to investigators that he sent the threatening emails, authorities said.

Court records don't indicate whether Ahrens has an attorney who could speak on his behalf.

Kelln Comments on Dacoma Crop

Monday Dacoma Coop Manager Jake Kelln said, "Dacoma is all but finished with harvest – down to three farmers to finish." Yields were far ranging from 20 to 70 bushels/acre. "The overall average made for a good harvest," he said.

Test weights "were strong as high as 66 pounds per bushel," Kelln said. "Total bushels were less than we hoped for, but it was a good, average harvest that was quick and safe. Anytime you can finish harvest with a full elevator there isn't much to complain about."

Kelln said he was thankful for the rain Sunday night as lots of his customers have large amounts of soybeans and milo planted that needed a drink.

"Our best wheat came from a farmer in Noel. The farmer would never let me use his name, but he raised one heck of a crop. His wheat averaged 67 bushels to the acre and had a test weight of 65 and protein of 12.8," Kelln said in amazement.

Burlington's Newman Says Well Over 90 Percent Complete

Burlington Co-op Manager Robbie Newman said the area got about one half

inch of rain Sunday night, which halted cutting Monday. That won't bother too many farmers because he said cutting in the Burlington area is "well over 90 percent finished," and added, "It's crazy how fast it went – a seven to ten day harvest."

Newman said, "It was a better than average crop with yields (bushels per acre) ranging from 35 to 65." Test weights averaged 62 or 63 (pounds per bushel). When asked about protein levels in the wheat, Newman said, "Our area had more than some. It varies based on the variety of wheat and how much fertilizer and fungicide farmers used."

If there was any downside to this 2021 wheat harvest, Newman said, "We had a little more dockage than we tend to have had in the past."

Overall on this crop, Newman said, "The moisture was wonderful. We had a dry spell in April but cool weather in May that allowed the head to fill well. This is two years in a row we've had good crops. We'll take in less wheat this harvest because our farmers have planted lots of alternative crops such as milo, sesame and soybeans primarily."

Lohmann Comments on Good Wheat Price

Jay Lohmann, manager of Wheeler Brothers Grain in Alva, said Tuesday morning they are 95 percent complete with wheat cutting.

Yields averaged 39 and Lohmann heard of yields as high as 80 bushels/acre. Test weights averaged 62 pounds/

bushel and proteins averaged 10 ½ percent.

Once Wheeler Brothers' customers started cutting wheat they were 90 percent finished in eight days, Lohmann said.

Looking at the 2021 harvest, Lohmann said, "It was great. We've got a good price. The live price is \$5.77 right now. That's the best harvest price we've had in the past few years. Nobody I know of had accidents or wrecks. We were happy."

Lohmann said he has customers who've planted milo, soybeans and a little sesame. "The rain Sunday night really helped. They are forecasting more rain toward the weekend. Everybody is tired. We have a few days to rest up and start farming."

Theilen Says Kiowa area is 75-80 percent finished

Ernie Theilen is manager of the O.K. Grain Cooperative in Kiowa that includes Hardtner and Hazelton. Sunday night the area received approximately one inch of rain – a little less in some areas. Combines, semis and grain carts sat idle Monday, but were expected to be back in the fields Tuesday.

Theilen estimates the Kiowa area is 75-80 percent finished cutting wheat. He's heard of yields that ranged from 30 to 70 bushels/acre, depending on whether or not producers used a fungicide. Test weights "were good at 64," he said and added that the crop had average protein levels.

\$4000. Council approved purchasing that one for the theater from Sonic Equipment of Iola, Kan.

In his administrative report, Demel said the city is to receive about \$141,000 in Covid funds. This is the city's first direct payment of Covid money, according to Demel.

At the end of the meeting, the council entered two executive sessions. Demel said there was no action taken after either session. One of those regarded seasonal staff pay rates. A few members of the swimming pool staff joined council members for that discussion. The other session regarded discussion about a piece of land located just north of the city shop area.

Emergency management asked the city to pass a resolution. Demel is getting more info and will discuss further at a future meeting.

SCTelcom General Manager Says Existing Building is a 'Money Pit'

SCTelcom's General Manager Carla Shearer addressed Kiowa's City Council about their office in Kiowa that is in the old ice plant building on the south side of Main St., near the intersection of 7th Street.

Shearer said they had "a significant water event in the basement of the (former) ice plant last December."

"The existing building is becoming a money pit," Shearer said and added, "My biggest concern is maintenance

of the building."

SCTelcom is considering purchasing a modular building and creating a Modular Communications Hut. She wants to relocate staff there. "The Kiowa office is busy," Shearer said. They are considering a building with a drive-through window. She confirmed they need an option for the interim.

The council stressed they want something aesthetically pleasing. Shearer told council she was not asking for any commitment that day – she just wanted their opinion. She told them that right now the cost of building vs. acquiring a building is three times higher than what it should be. And she mentioned the difficulty in getting building materials currently or a contractor who would commit to doing something before next year.

With regards to the neighboring lot, Shearer said she talked to the owner. She would like to meet with the board in executive session. Council assured Shearer they will discuss this matter further.

Barber County Extension Agent Talks Economic Development Survey

Barber County Extension Agent Robin Eubank-Callis spoke to council about their latest project to promote economic development and community vitality. She said the extension office is partnering with

the Barber County Commissioners. They hired an intern Sophie Dawson. "You'll know her as Sheryl Farney's granddaughter," Eubank-Callis told the council.

Eubank-Callis explained they are gathering info from each city to take back to the commissioners. This is Dawson's job to gather this info, compile it and take back to the commissioners.

This totally anonymous survey asks you to grade the community on doing business and the same for the county. Other questions are: In the last five years did your community's/county's business climate get weaker or stronger?; What's the most important thing you are doing to promote your community/county? Several more related questions followed.

When the question came of what the county could do, Councilman Hill quickly replied, "Lower property taxes!"

Before closing, Eubank-Callis complimented Kiowa on being "forward thinking" with their infrastructure project (waterline replacement). She said, "We're trying to retain our youth."

from Texas where they had rain delays, Theilen said harvest really got going. The bulk of harvest is completed in just over one week.

Pingelton Says Alva Area had "Good, Average Harvest"

Assistant General Manager Kevin Pingelton of the Farmers Cooperative in Alva said, "It's been good - a pretty average harvest."

Pingelton said grain yields ranged from 30 to the upper 50 bushels/acre. He said about eight-tenths of an inch of rain fell Sunday night that shut down cutting Monday.

Test weights "were good at 60 plus to 64," Pingelton said. Protein levels ranged from nine to 12 percent. "Overall we're seeing more dockage. There's more trash than we've seen like

joint grass, cheat and a little bit of rye."

Cherokee Area Had "Smooth, Steady" Harvest

Cherokee Coop Secretary Debbie Stoner said Monday that cutting is 70 to 75 percent complete in the Cherokee area. She said the Sunday night rain brought them eight-tenths of an inch and shut down wheat cutting Monday.

Stoner has heard yields from 40 to 70 bushels/acre. Test weights averaged 62 to 63 pounds. She said

protein levels averaged 11 to 11 1/2 percent to a few at 15 percent. "Chaf is always our most common dockage," Stoner said.

"Harvest went really smoothly and steady," Stoner said thankfully.



dent as well as being concerned about election integrity," Dennard said.

Todd's May 11 interview with Rep. Dan Crenshaw devolved into a fight when the Texas Republican was asked about his support for an effort to overturn the election. Crenshaw said it was "time to move on" and attacked the "liberal and pro-Democratic media" for continuing to bring up the subject.

"Don't start that," Todd said. "There's nothing lazier than that."

The interview soon ended.

"I understand where the 'invite and confront' people are coming from," said Jay Rosen, a New York University professor and author of the PressThink blog. "But in practice, the confrontation with a determined fabulist or denialist rarely works out to the viewer's advantage."

Few interviewers have the ability to effectively expose hypocrisy on live television, Negrin said. Even when a journalist can, politicians will take from the invitation to come on the air a message that they can say whatever they want and will still

have a platform.

The online provocateur said that he's been pleased that television producers and hosts are at least thinking about these issues.

"It's been (nearly) six months since the insurrection, eight months since the election, and I think a lot of hosts just want to get back to normal — interviewing Republicans, interviewing Democrats," Negrin said. "That's what they do."

"But, to me, it's important to remember what happened."
